did not appear before Squire Smyth yester-
day to answer to the charge of allowing
gambling on his premises. The case was
adjourned indefinitely.—Mr. and Mrs. James Gillean have re-

Mr. W. D. Gillean, manager of the Do-
minion Paper Company, Montreal. Mr.
and Mrs. Gillean took the St. Lawrence
route both ways and spent a most enjoy-
able time.—Mr. Eldon Westman has resigned the
position as organist of the Askin Street
Methodist Church. Mrs. S. Chadwick has
been appointed to fill the vacancy at an
annual salary of \$350, of which amount
she has undertaken to raise \$50 from
special concerts.—The G. T. R. annual fall excursion to
the west, good from Oct. 4 to Oct. 22,
necessitated the running of extra cars on
every train yesterday. Passengers came
from every point west of Hamilton. The
express leaving London at 7 o'clock p.m.
was run in two sections. Mr. M. C. G.
Dixon, district passenger agent, was in the
city looking after the interest of London

A. M., read the Masonic service at the
grave. The pallbearers were the three
brothers deceased and Messrs. Charles
Sterling, Samuel Winnett and J. P.

and T. H. Furdum.

Dr. Sims for Pastor.

At a largely attended business meeting
of Bond Street Congregational Church, To-
ronto, on Wednesday evening, it was de-
cided by an enthusiastic and unanimous
vote to install Dr. Sims in the permanent
pastorate of the church. Dr. Sims was
originally appointed as interim pastor, it
being assumed that Dr. Wild would return,
but from this report it would appear the
doctor does not mean to go back.

Trades and Labor Council.

Last evening the regular meeting of the
Trades and Labor Council was largely at-
tended. The committee who have in
charge the organizing of the relief branch
for the aid of unemployed members of
organized labor submitted an encouraging
report, and stated that at the next meeting
practicable plan would be submitted for
the approval of the council. The intention
is that the unions in affiliation with the
Trades Council shall unite in this work,
and that through the coming winter steps
will be taken to see that the members do
not have to depend on public charity. The
establishing of workshops that will not
enter into competition with city enterprises
is on the programme. The organizing com-
mittee reported that the store clerk had
decided to organize a union, and the out-
look was most favorable. It was resolved
that whereas steps have been taken
to have the tax of \$50 removed from
Chinamen entering Canada by public
bodies petitioning the Government for its
removal, this council most emphatically
protests on behalf of the workmen of
this city against any abolition of the tax,
and the secretary is instructed to com-
municate with the authorities and lay the
views of this council before them. The
following resolution, which speaks for
itself, was passed by a unanimous vote:
"That this council wishes to be under-
stood by the public that Messrs. John M.
Johnson and Andrew S. Johnson have not
now or never had authority to act in
any way whatever for this Trades Council,
as they have not at any time been con-
nected with it in any capacity whatever,
and we resent their action in pre-
suming to speak on behalf of this
