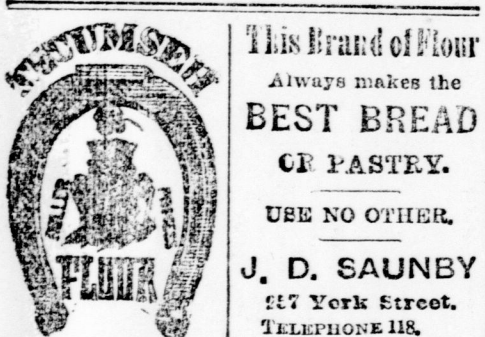

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—The Choral Society will not practice
this evening.—Mrs. James Gammack, Port Huron, is
visiting her father in this city.—F. H. Stoneman has obtained a permit
to erect a brick residence on Dundas street
near William, at a cost of \$2,100.—The young man of St. James' Church,
South London will give a concert in the
school house on Thursday evening.—President Burke, of the London Young
Liberals, was speaker at the great
banquet of Toronto Young Liberals last
night.—Up to the present date there has been
an increase of nearly 50 cases more before
the police magistrate as compared with last
year.—Sir John Carling, who was in Toronto
during the recent convention of liquor
makers and dealers, has returned to his
home in Ottawa.—Mr. Geo. Lott has sold his handsome
residence on Briscoe street and has pur-
chased a nice little farm near Parkhill.
His many friends wish him every success
in his new enterprise.—Mr. George Ingram, father of the
young man who met his death by accident
last Friday night in the G. T. R. yards
here, wishes to express his sincere thanks
for the general and hearty sympathy ex-
tended to the family in their great bereave-
ment.—Mr. E. J. James, who is leaving the
employ of D. S. Perrin & Co. to enter busi-
ness on his own account, was presented
with a handsome clock and a very com-
plimentary address by his fellow employes.
The address was signed by Messrs. Thos.
Watson, Charles Fitzwalter, Thos. Mc-
Farland and Chas. McNeil.—Mr. J. Watrous, of Brantford, was
among the visitors to the Chicago fair. He
secured two seats in a Pullman car and
occupied them as far as London, when,
during his temporary absence, they were
taken by other parties who refused to give
them up. Mr. Watrous sued the Pullman
people for \$1,000, and they have settled by
paying \$200 and \$300 costs.—Port Huron Times: Married, at the
residence of Mrs. Fleming, Miss Lizzie
McCormick, of Port Huron, and A. A.
Kleist, of Minneapolis. Supper was served
after the ceremony, which was performed
by Rev. Thos. Chalmers, of the Congrega-
tional Church. The wedding party left
on the evening train for London, Ont.—The high wind of the last 24 hours has
caused several chimney fires. The brigade
was called to box 81 on the Hamilton road
at 10 o'clock last night for that reason.
Again at 8 o'clock this morning they put
out a chimney fire at Miss Laird's dress-
making establishment on Talbot street and
at 10:45 a call from box 64 took the brigade
to Ontario street on a similar errand.—An Ottawa dispatch says: "Capt.
Williams, of the London branch of the
excise department, has been here for the
past few days on departmental business.
Incidentally he had an interview with Gen.
Herbert on military affairs, the captain
being instructor of the London Field Bat-
tery, and probably the only man in Canada
who has served her Majesty for half a
century."—Lieut.-Col. Smith, D. A. G., made an
official inspection of the stores of the
Seventh Battalion yesterday. This was
rendered necessary through the retirement
from office of Col. Payne, as, before he
could be relieved, "stock" would have to
be taken and a transfer made to the new
commanding officer. No appointment to
that position has yet been made, though it
is expected within a few days.—Goderich.—You are right. It is not
true, as has been stated by some news-
papers, that Father Lambert, the able
writer of one of the best exposures of Col.
Robert Ingersoll's sophistries regarding
the Bible, has left the Catholic Church.
Father Lambert is now editor of the
Catholic Times, Philadelphia. It is under-
stood that the Father Lambert who has
joined the Protestant body came from
Belgium five years ago.—George Armit appeared before Magis-
trate Parke this morning charged with
having driven too fast on the 5th. Sen-
tence was suspended. Jas. Drew, George
Insell and John Gavin, three young men,
got drunk last night and started to fight
in front of a hotel on Richmond street. Drew
and Insell were fined \$2 or ten days, and
Gavin, whose parents said he would not
work, was taxed \$5 or twenty days. The
trio took the days.—One of the principal speakers at the
Brussels Young Liberal banquet Friday was
"Mr. C. S. Hyman, M.P., this city. A dis-
patch says he made a powerful speech on
the trade question. He discussed the new
tariff at considerable length, and pointed
out that it had done little or nothing to-
ward modifying the National Policy. The
corruption accompanying an undue in-
creased expenditure resulting from protectionist
taxation were strongly condemned. Hon.
A. S. Hardy, Thomas Gibson, M.P.P., and
others spoke.—Mr. Donald H. McKechnie, who died
at 10 Marley Place, South London, Sunday,
was born in Scotland 48 years ago, and
came to Canada when young. He was with
Fitzgerald, Scandrett & Co., grocers, for
five years, and afterwards secured the de-
gree of M. D. over the border. Returning
to Canada he traveled for a Hamilton
grocery firm. He had been ill for a year
though active until recently. He leaves a
widow and three daughters, one of whom is
married and lives in Toronto, Misses Mand
and Belle being at home. The funeral will
take place Wednesday afternoon.—Mr. Frank Sanagan, who died yester-
day, was a well-known citizen, and for
years a leading merchant tailor here. He
was a London boy, the son of Mr. Frank
Sanagan, now of Detroit, and was 50 years
of age at his death. After leaving London
he was in business in Toronto for some
time, but returned to London two or threeyears ago. He was an excellent workman
and in health was universally liked for his
social disposition. He leaves a widow and
one son—Albert, of Chicago. The life of
deceased was well insured in the Woodmen
of the World and the A. O. U. W. (Fidelity
Lodge). He will be buried from the family
residence, 464 Talbot street, to-morrow
afternoon.—On Wednesday Miss McLeerie, only
daughter of the late John McLeerie, G. T.
R. station master at Chatham, was married
at the residence of her brother, Chas. Mc-
Leerie, Caron avenue, Windsor, by Rev. Dr.
Inglish, to Mr. Geo. Thomson, a wealthy
contractor of Chicago. The bridesmaids
were Miss McKay, Bowmanville; Miss Mc-
Leerie, Hamilton, and Miss Riddle, Chat-
ham. The groom was supported by Mr.
McCormick, of Chicago, Master Allen
McLeerie acting as page. Among the guests
were Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Dickson, Toronto;
Mr. and Mrs. James McLeerie and family,
Hamilton, and Mr. J. W. McLeerie, of
London. A large number of beautiful
presents were received by the bride from
her Chatham friends.

"Jamaica on Canvas."

Mr. Adam Brown, ex-M.P., Hamilton's
genial postmaster, is in the city. He has
attained considerable fame as a lecturer,
particularly with his World's Fair enter-
tainment. His latest is "Jamaica on
Canvas," which will be given at Victoria
Hall to-night. Mr. Brown, as commis-
sioner for Canada at the Jamaica exhibi-
tion, had every opportunity of studying
this beautiful island, and his impressions
will be related with his usual eloquence.
His descriptions will be vivified by a series
of fine views of the loveliest spots in that
country. As the lecture is given in aid of
the Y. M. C. A. it should be liberally
patronized, apart from its merit.

Taxes Are Due.

To-day was the last day on which city
taxes were payable and there was quite a
rush at the collector's office notwithstanding
the rough weather that leave their persons
until the last day, but moneyed persons
who can get a larger rate of interest on
their money than they have to pay on their
overdue taxes. One man who was reluct-
antly paying up remarked that he did not
think the council intended the collectors to
harass the ratepayers so. His taxes were
returned to him behind and an unexecuted
warrant had been hanging over his head
for three months. The rolls have to be
turned over to Treasurer Pope on the 16th,
and warrants will be issued for all delin-
quents.

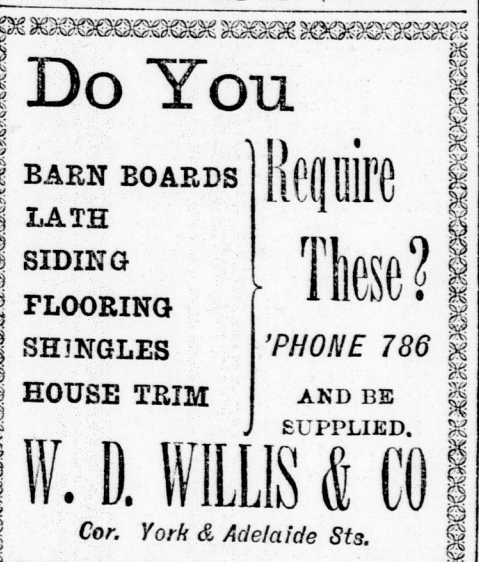
\$21,911 In Excess of Last Year.

No. 2 committee has undertaken to re-
duce the rate of taxation this year by mak-
ing their estimate \$71,706, compared with
\$49,795 last year. Of course, this latter
sum did not suffice last year, and \$2,526 23
was expended over and above the estimate.
In street maintenance alone the estimate of
this year exceeds the last by \$18,781. The
figures are: This year, \$67,550; last year,
\$48,575. There is an item labeled "Ex-
traordinary expenditure," and amounting
to \$3,300. It includes a stone crusher,
\$1,000; painting exhibition buildings,
\$1,000; band stand, Victoria Park, \$800;
repairs to steam roller, \$150. Ten hundred
and fifty dollars are needed for bridge re-
pairs, as against \$1,220 last year. There
may be some saving done by the council
and finance committee, however, before the
estimate is finally allowed.

THE TIMES OF '85.

The Seventh Commemorate Their
Trip Through the Gaps.They Fight Their Battles O'er Again
and Long for Some of Mrs.
Clarke's Pie—A Veteran Who
Had a Previous Engage-
ment—A Jolly Time.It is now nine years since the Seventh
Battalion was called on to assist in quelling
the rebellion in the Canadian Northwest.
Seasons have come and gone since that
memorable occasion, and like the seasons,
have gone many of the men who marched
down to the Grand Trunk station on April
7, 1885, to the air of "The Girl I Left
Behind Me." It was but a remnant of the old
battalion that gathered to celebrate the oc-
casion last night, but what was lacking in
numbers was made up in enthusiasm. Time
has left its mark, and not more than 50
veterans answered to the roll call of last
night. The rest are scattered, some are
dead, and others have left the country.
There was a short street parade before the
banquet, the ex-members walking in
civilian clothes, with the exception of those
who are still connected with the military
in one way or another. The Seventh Band
again led the procession and once more
played the familiar strains about the girls
that were left behind, but this time for a
shorter interval.Secretary Ironside read several charac-
teristic letters of genuine regret from far-
away comrades, letters in which fleeting
reference was made to Mrs. Clarke's pies,
hard tack, and other delicacies that the
campaign was noted for.Among those of genuine regret none
were more sincere than that of Pte. Charles
Henderson, an inmate of the Stony
Mountain Prison. He pleaded a previous
engagement.Letters were also read from Sergt.
Maj. Baxter, First Hussars; Capt. Geo. M.
Reid, Rev. Mr. Ball (the old chaplain, late
of Vancouver, now of Toronto), Capt. R.
Dillon and F. Dayton.Supper was served in the City Hotel's
best style. The menu was in the
shape of a tent and embellished by many
reminders of the times of 1885.Major A. M. Smith, who was in the
chair, introduced the toast list. Lieut.
Chisholm, Corp. Wanless and Pte. Dignan
replied to the toast of "Canada Our Home."The "Militia of Canada" was coupled
with the names of Capt. McKenzie, Lieut.
Baptist and Pte. Walter Wright, the latter
singing a song.Dr. Niven and Major J. B. Smyth replied
to the toast of "Our Staff."The memory of departed comrades was
toasted in silence."Sister Corps" brought replies from
Sergt. Cranston, No. 1 Company, R. C. R.
I. (late Winnipeg Light Infantry), and
Corp. Millie, No. 1 Company, R. C. R. I.
(late of "A" Battery, Quebec).Dr. Niven then took charge of the toast
