—General Humidity is getting there.
—Mr. John Spencer, Owen Sound,
formerly expert at the chemical works,
East London, is on a business visit to
the city.

—Mrs. S. Chadwick is officiating at
the instrument while Mr. Moxon, or-
ganist of Dundas Street Center Metho-
dist Church, is away for a brief holi-
day.

—Two Barnardo Home boys—Robert
Cooper and John Rogers—pleaded
guilty on Saturday to bathing in the
river near Blackfriars bridge. Squire
Lacey allowed them to go with a warn-
ing. Future offenders will not be so
leniently dealt with.

—James Taylor, of Adelaide street
north, has been committed for trial by
Squire Lacey on a charge of break-
ing into Charles Taylor's house, up-
setting the lighted lamp and causing a
fire. The offense occurred on the 3rd,
when the only person in the house was
a little girl. The accused claims be-
ing drunk, and denies upsetting the
lamp intentionally. He was bailed.

SUDDEN DEATH.

The sudden death occurred yesterday
morning on Chesapeake street of Mr. Hance
Walker, a brother of Messrs. John and Wil-
liam Walker, brick-makers. Deceased had
not been working since Tuesday last, and
was not feeling well. He was around on
Saturday, and yesterday morning partook
of breakfast apparently much improved in
condition. About nine o'clock he died very
suddenly, death being due, it is said, to the
rupture of a blood vessel in the brain. He
leaves a wife and family. Deceased was a
member of Abingdon Orange Lodge, and was
much respected by all who knew him.

MRS. ANN BRENNER, DECEASED.
Mrs. Ann Brenner, for 34 years a
resident of London, died on Friday.
Deceased was a native of Trinity Bay,
Newfoundland, daughter of John Til-
lev, who was in his time a conspicuous
man of affairs in the region. He was
the first to establish the industry of
salmon canning, and claimed to be
the originator of the process which
has since developed so enormously.
Deceased married in 1844 William, eld-
est son of Alexander Brenner, of Cana-
dian, who was from 1819 the agent of
Slade Bros., of Poole, until their fail-
ure in 1864, and also stipendiary magis-
trate of Bonavista district. He after-
wards became a school master and
instructor in navigation. The late Mrs.
Brenner came to Canada in 1855, and
settled with her family in London as
stated, being among the earliest set-
tlers in London South, and a member
of the first Methodist congregation in
the village. She was of late years
a member of Dundas Street Church.
She was the mother of ten children, of
whom three daughters and five sons
survive her, namely, Isabel, Margaret
and Jessie; Alexander John, Malcolm
Graeme, Archibald, Ronald and Rob-
ert. The interment took place this
morning at Mount Pleasant, at 10
o'clock.

COBOURG'S LOSS, LONDON'S GAIN.
Counour Sentinel-Star: "At a meeting
of the London, Ont., School Board on Tues-
day night the position of English Master in
the Collegiate Institute was awarded to Mr.
W. H. Horton, of the Cobourg Institute
staff. As the salary attached to the position
is \$900, and advances to \$1,000, Mr. Horton
was expected to accept the position, though
averse to leaving Cobourg for personal
reasons. Mr. Horton's time will not be out
until the first of the year, but the Board
will not likely stand in his way of improv-
ing himself. Mr. Horton has been a model
citizen, and his many friends in Cobourg
will regret to learn of his proposed removal.
He has been a teacher of the highest
success, the high standard of excellence
attained by the Cobourg Collegiate Insti-
tute being due, in part, to his efficient
teaching. He will be sure to succeed in
London."

ANGELICAN PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

Amendments to Canons Which Will Be
Discussed.

The sixteenth meeting of the Provincial
Synod of the ecclesiastical province of
Canada, to open in Montreal on Sept. 11, is
expected to be an interesting one.

Among the notices of motion received by
the secretary is one from the Archbishop of
Kingston, who promises to move, "That,
with a view to promote unity of action and
more harmonious management of the Church
missionary work at home and abroad, this
provincial synod is of opinion that the in-
terests of the Church will henceforth be
best served by the existing Domestic and
Foreign Missions Society being merged in
the Anglican Church of Canada, and that
the same shall be an integral part of the eastern
section of the permanent committee of the
General Synod."

In the preamble of this motion it is stated
among other reasons for the proposed
change, that "the experience of the sister
church in the United States, indicates the
advantage of having one missionary society
co-extensive with the Church in Canada."
This motion may be of interest to the Church
of England missionaries who look for
changes which promise greater encourage-
ment of their work.

There are two amendments proposed to
Canon XIII. This canon reads as follows:
"No alteration shall be made in the
Book of Common Prayer, the adminis-
tration of the Sacrament and the rites and
ceremonies of the Church, the articles of re-
ligion or the form and manner of making,
ordaining and consecrating bishops, priests,
and deacons; or the version of the Scriptures
authorized to be read in churches, unless the
same shall be enacted at one session of the
provincial synod and confirmed at another
session of the same; provided by two-thirds
of each order of the Lower House."

"Nevertheless, any alteration or addition
made to the prayer book or articles by the
Church of England in her convocations, or
authorized by parliament, may be accepted
for use in this ecclesiastical province by the
provincial synod at one session only, with-
out the necessity for further confirmation."
The first amendment to be moved by the
Rev. Prof. Clark, of Trinity College, To-
ronto, is to omit the words "or the version
of the Scriptures authorized to be read in
churches." The second change is proposed
by Mr. J. A. Worrell, Q.C. He will move
that the following clause be added to the
canon: "That all such additions and al-
terations shall be made or accepted by
canon."

There are several other important mo-
tions to come before the synod. The
Bishop of Niagara will move among other
things that "No church or chapel shall be
consecrated until the incumbent and church
wardens shall have placed in the hands of
the bishop, to be kept on record by him, a
certificate that the building and ground on
which it is erected have been fully paid for,
etc." Memorials from the synods of the
Diocese of Toronto, the Diocese of Mon-
treal, and the Diocese of Huron have also
been received by the secretary.
