YOUTHFUL VANDALS.

Boys Break Open a Vault in an Albany Cemetery-Coffin Opened and the Remains Scattered.

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 4.—Some time Monday night, in old St. John's Catholic cemetery, Delaware avenue, in this city, a vault, said to contain the remains of a young girl named Shea, who died about fifteen years ago, was broken into by a gang of young vandals. The vault consisted of a double thickness of brick laid, and was covered with a stone slab weighing many hundred pounds. To remove the slab was beyond the boys' power, so they dug under the slab until they reached the bricks. These they quickly demolished, and an opening large enough for a boy to enter was made. The coffin which contained the remains is a metallic one with glass face, in a good state of preservation. The glass was broken and the bones taken out by the boys and scattered about the tomb. A prayer book, rosary, and trinkets which had been inclosed in the coffin were pulled out and also scattered about. A new coffin was provided this afternoon, and the ramains inclosed and removed to Calvary cemetery. 
