The Great Historic Ball to be Held Tonight.

How Sir Charles Tupper Has Represented a Presbyterian Preacher.

Three Million Dollars to be Spent on Canadian Military Equipment.

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—Another extraordinary development in the Cape Breton campaign of Sir Charles Tupper has come to light. It will be remembered that at a public meeting at Glace Bay, Sir Charles Tupper read a telegram from Dr. Isaac Murray, Presbyterian divine at North Sydney, in which he heartily endorsed Sir Charles' method of settling the school question and declaring in favor of equal rights and justice to all. As the majority of Dr. Murray's congregation were utterly opposed to the stand taken by him, there has since been much friction between the preacher and the people, and he has been asked to resign. It now turns out that no such telegram was sent, and that Sir Charles Tupper was merely indulging in one of his romances. It is said that Dr. Murray wrote to Sir Charles asking him not to repeat the statement, and also wrote to the publisher of the North Sydney Herald warning him not to publish it in that paper. It is also stated that when Dr. Murray was asked why he did not deny Sir Charles Tupper's statement at once when he saw he was using the bogus telegram story to deceive the people, the doctor said he hesitated to publicly brand Sir Charles as a liar, and let the matter rest. Dr. Murray is a Conservative, hence the unwarranted liberty taken with him.

The Senate Chamber is now in readiness for the fancy ball, to be given tonight by Lord and Lady Aberdeen. This unique ball is intended to be representative of the most striking periods of Canadian history, and a series of dances have been organized by Ottawa ladies with this object in view. There is to be a Liebfrau and a group of the first Norse discoverers of Canada, in which the Government House party will figure. Cabot, Jacques Cartier, Champlain, De Mont, Sir William Alexander, Charles de la Tour, Maisonneuve Frontenac, Evangeline, Montcalm and Wolf, General Haldemond and Governor Simcoe will all be there in due historic sequence. And all at from \$5 to \$10 a head. That is the price per costume for the evening's hire from a Montreal firm, which has been taken advantage of by Ottawa people not desirous of getting a new and expensive costume for the night's entertainment.

Pettions have been received from the London Trades and Labor Council, the Toronto United Garment Workers, and the Toronto Upholsterers' International Union asking to be exempted from the provisions of the criminal code relating to combines and conspiracies.

Judge Johnson, Sault Ste. Marie, has been appointed commissioner to investigate the charges against the Noble brothers, of Collingwood.

P. E. Lesner, who was in the civil service for many years, but was recently superannuated, died Saturday, aged 64 years.

The Canadian Deep Waterways Commission is holding a meeting here to confer with the Government as to the progress being made. The engineers are working together satisfactorily, and will, it is expected, have completed a joint report by May next at the most practical point. The Canadian commissioners are instructed not to commit this country to any scheme. They will simply report on the topographical and engineering questions, but not on the advisability of combining a common route.

The report was in circulation yesterday that Lieut.-Gov. Mackintosh, of the Northwest Territories, had resigned. Inquiry in official circles, however, elicited the statement that there was no truth in it.

Sir Charles Tupper has sent word to Winnipeg that he cannot at present attend the Manitoba Conservative convention owing to ill-health.

It is now said to be about decided by the militia authorities to adopt a magazine rifle for the force. Whether the weapon chosen will be the Lee-Enfield or the Lee-Enfield (the difference between which lies only in grooving, both weapons taking the same bullet, that is, .303) has not yet transpired. Communications have recently been received from Col. Lake, quartermaster-general, at present in England, who speaks in high terms of the assistance which War Office and the Horse Guards are rendering to him. The most modern equipment, in the shape of big guns, is also to be procured for garrison and field batteries, and possibly a supply of Maxim-Nordenfolt guns. The total appropriation which Parliament will be asked to vote will be in the vicinity of three million dollars.

An effort is being made to revive the Chignecto ship railway scheme, in which over \$3,000,000 of American and British capital has been sunk. A bill has been introduced in Parliament asking that the time for the completion of the railway be extended five years in order that the company may receive the annual subsidy of \$170,000 the Dominion Government is pledged to pay the stockholders on the completion of the marine railway.

Sir Charles Tupper is staying with his son in New Edinburgh. He has not been able to be at his office since he returned from Cape Breton, and was only once at the House for two or three hours on the day he was introduced. He is said to be in poor health.

David McLaren, a prominent lumberman, has left for England to see the Secretary for the Colonies with a view of getting a Mr. Lingham, who was a partner of his in South Africa, and who was put in prison by the Transvaal Government, out of jail.

Landerkin and Mr. Lowell were guests of Wm. Gibson, M.P. for Lincoln, at St. Catharines on Saturday. They spoke at an enthusiastic Liberal convention. Mr. W. Gibson was renominated as the Liberal standard-bearer for Lincoln.

Liberal Premier Peters of Prince Edward Island is here to attend the February session of the Supreme Court which opens on Tuesday.

Mr. Mulock's bill respecting interest will be considered by the committee on Feb. 27. It has been made the first order for that day.

An effort is being made to induce the Dominion Government to transfer the nine lepers now held in restraint in British Columbia, to the new lazaretto recently erected at a cost of \$20,000 at Tracadie, N. B. In this institution there are nine male and sixteen female patients. Three died during the past year. For many years Dr. A. C. Smith has been in charge of this institution. Regarding the result of his experience with leprosy patients, he says: "No real cure for leprosy has yet been discovered. My predecessor, Dr. Nicholson, and after him myself, have treated several of our lepers with colored water, to see if the influence of the mind over the body would cause change, and in every instance it did so. For a time all symptoms of the disease were in abeyance, and there was a decided improvement, but, of course, only for a time, and it seemed to me that the disease made up for lost time afterwards."

Recruits by Scores.

Many Dissatisfied Conservatives in the Maritime Provinces Will Support the Liberal Candidates at the Coming Elections.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 17.—The Liberals are expressing great satisfaction over the fact that quite a number of Conservatives or men who were formerly Conservatives, attended the party banquet on Wednesday night. Attorney-General Longley, in his speech, stated that there were scores present who, in 1891, worked and voted against the Liberal party. Among them in attendance who attracted attention on account of their new Liberal faith, were Mr. John Forbes, manager of the Forbes Manufacturing Company, and Mr. Thomas Forhan, sail manufacturer. County Warden Shatford had a ticket, but was unable to attend. He is known to have expressed strong disapproval of the present course of the Dominion Government, which he formerly supported, and to have signified his intention to vote for the Liberal candidates in the coming election.

AN IMPORTANT QUERY.

What Should the Farmer Feed Along With Corn?

"What Shall We Feed With Corn?" At the farmers' institute this winter the corn crop has been the popular theme. Although it is an important crop any year, this year its importance has been so apparent that there is some danger of its becoming too popular.

Corn cannot be fed profitably alone, being rich in carbo-hydrates, but poor in albuminoids—so much so that we must find something to feed with it that has a predominance of albuminoids. Peas and beans are about the only grains that grow that will aid much in securing this balance. The grasses are nature's perfect feed and are evenly balanced, but wheat and oat straw, like corn, are poor as flesh-formers, creating largely heat and energy. When hay is abundant we do not feel this to the same extent that we do this winter, when we must feed almost wholly corn and straw.

When we feed half hay, we require only one-half as much peas, beans, or clover to get the proper balance. Even when we feed a less than a bushel of peas, beans, or clover, those who missed a catch of grass last summer on account of drought and grasshoppers, would do well to consider whether it would not be better to sow millet than to depend on corn alone. Millet has a slight excess of flesh-formers, yields a heavy crop of very nutritious hay, if cut early, and helps to clean the soil. It is said by some to be very hard on the land, but I do not know that it leaves the soil in excellent tilth; no better bed could be desired for fall wheat.

Usually it is the maturing of the seed that draws the heaviest response from the millet should be cut before that, or it becomes hard and woody. If I had not a silo I would prefer it to corn, except in fall and early winter. Corn is hard to cure as fodder. By the time it is ready to cut there is not sufficient heat and drought to completely dry so large and succulent a stock between snow. If taken in before that both stock and ears are liable to rot, and even when the ears are in a barn, and if left out it soon bleaches, and is often out to pieces by mice. Later it gets frozen to the ground and clogged with snow and ice, and even when it appears quite dry, if run through a cutting box will often heat and spoil in a few days. If fed uncut, the manure is hard to handle, and in untidy shape to put on the land. All the disadvantages of handling are overcome by the silo, and with the knowledge now possessed, a silo can be built so cheaply, that the poor farmer cannot afford to be without one.

A NEW BIBLE.

Chicago, Feb. 17.—The new Bible prepared for the use of public schools has been published, and will now be submitted to the Board of Education. The aim of the compilers was to prepare a work that would be unobjectionable to any religious denomination. It is 22 pages since the Board of Education started the reading of the Bible in the public schools here. A few years ago a movement was begun to reinstate the Scriptures. The book just completed is the outgrowth of a suggestion made by Prof. David Swing, a Unitarian minister, consisting of members of the Protestant, Catholic, Jewish and other denominations compile a book for the use of the school children made up of selections from the Bible.

INCENDIARISM IN PORT HURON.

Port Huron, Mich., Feb. 17.—The Germania House, conducted by Henry Kaise, had a narrow escape from destruction by fire Friday night. Five different times fire was discovered in the building, and the last time, at an early hour Saturday morning, the flames had gained considerable headway before being discovered. Part of the building was considerably damaged, all the whole stock suffered from smoke and water. The last time the fire broke out, beds in three different rooms were found on fire. Mr. Kaise, the landlord, says he believes some enemy attempting to burn him out. The house is owned by Mrs. Kate Hecke and both building and furnishings were insured. He believes that the fire was undoubtedly of incendiary origin.

With Rat Poison.

Mrs. Nolan, of Gesto, Said to Have Killed Her Husband.

Strong Evidence Secured by a Detective—Accused Said to Have Made Threats.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 17.—Provincial Detective Freer has returned from Essex, where he has been engaged for the past ten days on the Gesto poisoning case, and has succeeded in working up strong evidence against Mrs. Henrietta Nolan, colored, wife of George Nolan, of New Canaan, awaiting trial on a charge of poisoning her husband. Owing to the reluctance of witnesses to testify against the accused, considerable difficulty has been experienced in getting at the true facts of the case.

The report of the analyst, Dr. Ellis, showed the presence of phosphorus in the stomach, but the defence claim that the symptoms were caused by morphine, which had been injected medicinally prior to death.

A strong point against the accused, however, is the purchase by her of some rat poison from a local druggist, and the report of the analyst is to the effect that phosphorus came similar to that found in the stomach was found in the rat poison.

It was further proven that the prisoner had been living with another man in Windsor and was arranging to return to him and that she had told Isaac Lear, Sarah Lear, and others that her husband would not live long.

The accused witness is being defended by Jas. Davis, the colored lawyer.
