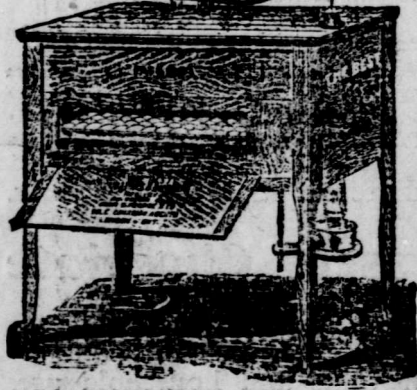

Victorious Once More!

Methuen's Men Defeated a Force of 8,000 Boers,

in a Ten-Hour Fight on Modder River,

Without Food or Water and in the Burning Sun.

"One of the Most Trying Fights in the Annals of the British Army."

News From Kimberley Up to Nov. 23.

The Garrison in Good Health and Water Plentiful.

Enemy Abandoning Their Camps South of the Town—Boers Losing Confidence as to Their Ultimate Success.

London, Nov. 23—11:55 a.m.—Gen. Methuen has defeated the whole Boer force at Modder River.

The war office has received the following dispatch from Gen. Buller: Cape Town, Tuesday, Nov. 23.—Gen. Methuen reports: "Modder River, Tuesday, Nov. 23.—Reconnoitered at 5 a.m. the enemy's position on River Modder, and found them strongly entrenched and concealed. There were no means of outflanking them, the river being full.

"Action was commenced with artillery, mounted infantry and cavalry at 5:30. The guards on the right and the ninth brigade on the left, attacked the position in a widely-extended formation at 6:30, and, supported by the artillery, found in front of them the whole Boer force, 8,000 strong, with two large guns, four Krupps, etc.

"The naval brigade rendered great assistance from the railway.

"After desperately hard fighting, which lasted ten hours, our men, without food or water, and in the burning sun, made the enemy quit his position.

Gen. Pole-Carew was successful in getting a small party across the river, gallantly assisted by 300 sappers.

"I speak in terms of high praise of the conduct of all who were engaged in one of the hardest and most trying fights of the British army. If I can mention one arm particularly, it is two batteries of artillery."

began, the Guards forming the reserve. The column disembarked on the plain eastward of the Boer Kopjes. The Boer guns opened fire. Two batteries of British artillery, posted on each side, shelled the Boers, practice being good on both sides. The Boers stuck to their positions, firing steadily and accurately.

DEADLY DUEL.
The duel, which continually became hotter, lasted three hours. The Boer shells wounded several men of the naval brigade. Finding it impossible to displace the Boers, by artillery, Gen. Methuen resolved upon an infantry attack. A brigade of infantry, including the Yorkshires, Northampton, Northumberland and Lancshires, with the naval brigade on the right, gallantly stormed the Boer position in the face of a shattering fire. The Boers, after hill, the brigade under Col. Money carrying the main hill under a terrible fire, but suffering severely.

BOERS LOSING CONFIDENCE.
London, Nov. 23.—Benet Bureleigh cables the Daily Telegraph as follows: "The Boers, after the battle of the medical corps, who brought the wounded from the Beacon Hill fight, cheered with Boers, who expressed doubts of their ultimate victory, although they were sure God was with them."

HEROIC CONDUCT.
"It was in consequence of a letter from Gen. Joubert to Gen. Hildyard, requesting to allow us to remove our dead, that Major Jennings went with the ambulance. Gen. Joubert asked him to surrender the Boer dead and wounded, but we had none. The Boer doctors would not allow the ambulance to approach until dark, when they wounded were carried down the hill to the wagons. The enemy then bade the British to retire smartly lest they be fired upon accidentally. The enemy excused themselves for firing on the ambulance during the action, on the ground that an officer was seeking shelter there. Our wounded say they were well and promptly treated.

"Major Jennings confirms a report that one of the reservists, a London grocer, who had a leg shattered during the fight, got a comrade to pull the leg straight and turn him on his stomach, when he fired 24 shots at the advancing Boers. He did not flinch, despite his sufferings.

BOER PLANS.
London, Nov. 23.—The Berlin Deutsche Zeitung publishes the following dispatch, dated Pretoria, Nov. 27, received through Boer diplomatic channels: President Kruger and President Steyn have instructed Gen. Joubert and Gen. Cronje not to split their forces into small detachments, but to strike vigorous blows. Gen. Joubert has three corps—one holding Lady-smith, the second commanding the Tugela, and the third east of Estcourt, in order to cut off the British retreat. Gen. Cronje's forces are divided into three contingents—one at Kimberley, another at Modder River, and the third in the rear of Gen. Methuen.

FRENCH NEUTRALITY.
At the beginning of the hostilities the French consuls at Pretoria and Johannesburg issued notices in the papers that the Frenchmen must observe the strictest neutrality. They were counsels were followed, for while the Germans, Dutch and Americans formed volunteer corps no French corps was formed. No Frenchmen joined the Boers, but some entered the international police force, which was organized to protect foreign property. These police rendered great services, protecting not only French, but English property that had been hurriedly forsaken by its owners.

NEW CARTRIDGE BELT.
The war office has decided to test the Mills-Wells cartridge belt in use in the United States army, and has given an initial order to a Boston firm, which at the outbreak of the Transvaal war transferred a factory to England, immediately receiving a recommendation from the British army for the mentioned order. The British army is now using leather cartridge belts, which have been found to become stiff and covered with vermin.

KAISER WANTS PEACE.
The Paris correspondent of the London Times telegraphs the substance of an interview he has had with a distinguished German, who went to England to observe what was going on during the visit of the Kaiser, and who said: "I do not think the emperor went to England purely for political
