British Garrison at Dewetsdorp Captured by Boers-British Reoccupy the Position-Gen. Delarey in a Tight Place.

Cape Town, Nov. 30 .- In the course of his address to the refugees' committee on Tuesday, Sir Alfred Milner admitted that there had been a general miscalculation as to the time when peace would be restored. Guerilla operations intended to inflict the maximum of injuries upon the victors were causing delay, and he finally pointed out that those fit and willing to render military service could hasten their own return and that of the other refugees by joining the volunteers in the

RAIDERS ARE BOLD. London, Nov. 30 .- A dispatch, dated Co.esourg, Cape Colony, Nov. 29, says: Boer rangers have reached the Orange haver. They have fired into the British camp, on the Cape Colomy side, at Sandritt, killing one man and wounding two others.

FROM LORD ROBERTS. London, Nov. 29.—Lord Roberts cautes from Johannesburg, under date of wednesbury, Nov. 82: The Lewelsdorp garrison of two guns of the buh Field Battery, with detaumments of the Glotkestershire Regiment, the Highland Light inlandly and Inten Ranes, 400 in an, surrendered at 5:30 p.m., Nov. 23. Our losses were lo men killed and 42 wounded, including Major H. J. Anson and Capt. Digby. The enemy is said to be 2,000 strong. Fourteen nundred men were dispatched arom Euch-burgh to reheve Dewetsdorp, but they did not succeed in reaching there on time. Knox joined this force and found Dewetsoorp evacuated. CHASING THE ENEMY. London, Nov. 29.-Lord Roberts calbles the war office from Johannesburg, Nov. 28, that Col. Plumer drove 500 Boers from Dewagen Drift, killing three, on Nov. 23. Colonel Campbell carried the Boers' main position at Tigerskloof. The British had a lieutenant killed and a major severely wounded, and one man killed and two

wounded. DELAREY SHUT IN

A dispatch from Johannesburg, undated, of the 25th, says that Gen. Deharey, with a command of 800 men, attacked Gen. Clements on Friday, northwest of Krugersdorp. The Boers brought a gun into position on the hills during the night and began shelling the British camp at 3 o'clock in the morning. After an hour's firing the British guns silenced the single one used by the Boers. Severe fighting followed, in which the Boers suffered heavily. The British buried 25 burghers and took twenty prisoners. Delary found himself in a difficult position, and asked for an armistice for 24 hours. This Gen. Clement's agreed to, but at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon the Boers resumed firing. It is reported Delarey is surrounded, and It is impossible for him to escape.

CAPTURED PROVISIONS. Pretoria, Nov. 29.—Co.s. Plumer and Hickman, during Gen. French's operations at Klip Riversburg, captured three wagons loaded with provisions that were identified as being part of the supplies that were distributed by the British for the relief of the Boer inhabitants of Johannesburg.

PLUCKY CANADIANS. Gen. Smith-Dorrien's column returned to Belfast after a five days' march from Bullstroom. They had only one casualty. On the return journey the Canadians, while scouting, rode close to an ambush pre-pared by the Boers.
