doctor, "I myself am much surprised at them. The standard of the medical profession has been raised by the presence of the school here and in numerous other ways it has been of benefit to the city. Its pecuniary advantages have been felt, too, and the students who attend leave annually from \$25,000 to \$30,000 in the city. Besides this, many families have been drawn to reside in the city on account of the school. The teachers' remuneration is trifling considering the time spent. "I am quite satisfied," said Dr. McCallum, "that the grounds upon which Mr. George M. Reid ran were entirely non-political."

"The poor have heard of a thousand and one misdeeds in that hospital, such as that bones were fractured to be re-

from the never-ending audacity of elected persons." "Allow me to go back into a little history of three years ago, when Dr. Wilson was the occupant of the mayor's chair. He succeeded in dividing the profession into 'schoolmen' and 'outsiders.' This was the beginning of this whole hospital trouble. He contended at that time that the 'schoolmen' should be content with the winter months. He followed up his contention by saying that as the outsiders were over 40 and the 'schoolmen' were about 20 in number, that eight months should be given to the 'outsiders,' and four months to the 'schoolmen,' setting himself as the mouthpiece of the 'outsiders.' As the 'schoolmen' had the right to nominate their staff, he, along with the trust, gave the outside physicians the right to nominate their staff. The outside physicians met at the beginning of last year and nominated the staff. Only one of the present 'clique' calling themselves the 'out-

side profession among the outsiders, except those in the clique. The bylaws introduced by Messrs. Reid and Waterman attempted to make life appointments of this 'clique,' with the proviso that those over 60 years should retire. The whole board, however, changed it to two years' tenure of office but they failed to destroy the rider to the bylaw that one over 60 years of age should retire. In a small city like ours a good man may continue to be of excellent service to the hospital and community long past this limit of life. "But to return to the election of today, George Reid, without any organization behind him, except such as the doctors could put up, and that a poor one by reason of the fact that we are not skilled in this thing, made a masterly stand against a complete and unique organization, George M. Reid appeared in the field at our suggestion in order to throw the nomination to Adam S. McMahon. There was no intention of having a contest, and we

were congratulating ourselves that the hospital controversy was going to pass out of politics. Mr. Reid agreed with us that Adam T. McMahon was a most excellent choice. But the 'clique' at once set to work to sidetrack Mr. McMahon. "At 6 o'clock on the day when they could withdraw George Reid asked Adam McMahon to stay in the field and he would withdraw in his favor. The latter thought it wise to withdraw, leaving Mr. Reid alone in the field to face the other nominee. Mr. Reid declined to run the contest as a political one and said that he was simply in the hands of the doctors who signed that petition; that he considered the request of the petition a reasonable one, and the denial of it on the part of the trust an outrageous act. While we have been defeated tonight by 739 of a majority against us, compared to
