DELAWARE CHEESE FACTORY.
Inspector Barr found it in Good Condition—Gives Useful Hints.

Inspector Barr, of the western district, and instructor of the dairy school at Stratford, made a visit to the Delaware cheese factory on Thursday. He found the factory in good condition and doing excellent work. The June cheese had all been disposed of, and large quantities of milk had been manufactured into cheese during the month, and over \$3,000 are ready for distribution.

The highest price of the London cheese market was paid for all the shipment to date, being 8 3/4 cents per pound. The average for the month is 7 3/4 cents.

The inspector spent the day in testing the milk as it arrived at the factory, and then assisted in making up the day's batch of cheese.

In the evening a good representation of the 32nd batch met in the curing room to listen to a lecture by the inspector on the care of milk before it is made into cheese.

The cheesemaker, Mr. E. J. Boyes, and spoke of the exceptional advantages the factory had in being able to dispose of its cheese at the highest market rate and so soon after being made.

He showed how the pattern being used by the factory was the financial gain by sending the clean milk to the factory. This could be done by cooling and keeping it away from stable pigens, etc.

After the lecture 2-year-old cheese of fine quality with crackers was passed around.

Too Hot to Talk, the City Fathers Adjourned Early

Last Night's Meeting of Council Was Short Lived.

Move in the Direction of Increasing Mayor's Salary.

Queen's Avenue Ratepayers State Expressly They Want Competition in Pavement Work.

Two matters of more than ordinary interest characterized last night's meeting of the city council, but the intense heat supplanted the energy of those aldermen who are usually particularly verbose, and the result was that discussions were short-lived and few.

Ald. Greenleaf brought the former matter before the council by moving that No. 1 committee be empowered to look into the advisability of increasing the salary of the mayor.

The alderman, in speaking to his motion, stated that the salary of the mayor was a disgrace to the citizens. Hamilton paid \$2,000 a year to its mayor and Toronto, City of London and places all paid a respectable indemnity.

London ought to be ashamed to offer such a pittance to their chief magistrate, and the matter ought to be dealt with as soon as possible," concluded Ald. Greenleaf. The motion was seconded by Ald. Garratt, and it carried without opposition.

A largely signed petition from Hodgson G. Abbott and 66 others, was presented to the council asking for a 27-foot street asphalt pavement on Queen's avenue, with a ten-year guarantee and the usual specifications.

The petition was expressly stated that the people want competition. An argument ensued as to whether the water commissioners or the board of works, and it was finally decided to send it to the assessment commissioner, who will report to the board of works Thursday.

The mayor and city clerk were empowered to sign the agreement recommended by the board of works, and the request was sent to the City Engineer, who will report to the board of works Thursday.

The council adjourned to meet again on Monday, Aug. 15.

DIED AS RESULT OF AN ACCIDENT

Member of "B" Company Sustains Fatal Injuries in South Africa.

The death is reported from South Africa of George W. McBeth, formerly of Stratford.

McBeth was a member of B Company of Canada's first contingent to South Africa, and went through the severe campaign with the regiment, sharing in the most important of the engagements. Later he returned to his home, where he appeared to be meeting with success.

Full particulars of the death of the young man have not been received, but it seems that while sleeping across a train on June 3 he did not notice any approaching on the next track. He was struck by a train and killed.

McBeth, however, survived the injury until July 14, when his death occurred. The deceased was one of the most popular men in B Company, the members of which will be sorry to hear of his death. McBeth was a particularly close friend of Henry Eads and Clifford, the two going side by side through the campaign in the first contingent. Eads died some months ago in the Classic City.
