In his report, E. B. E. Belts, the grand treasurer, reported that, including the balance of 1908, the receipts for the year amounted to \$4,574.44. The expenditure amounted to \$3,417.18, so that there was a balance of \$1,156.78 at the close of the financial year.

METHODIST PROFESSORS MAY TAKE A PLEDGE

To Be Asked to Subscribe to
Certain Great Truths of
the Church.

Toronto, Aug. 11.—Another red-hot battle of words over theological teaching in Methodist colleges is expected to be unavoidable at the general conference of the Methodist Church in Canada, which opens next week in Victoria, B. C.

It is feared by those who hope for a peaceful session that such another stormy controversy as was waged at Toronto Methodist conference in June is on the tapis. Therefore they are already planning to prevent it. The scheme talked of among Toronto Methodist preachers now is to draw up a general statement of doctrine to which all professors in Methodist training schools will be required to subscribe.

Only the Great Truths.
"This will be a definite method of settling the stormy discussions that have been going on for years now," said one prominent local Methodist minister today. "The statement which professors will be asked to sign will contain only great evangelical truths, to which the Methodist Church has always held fast. Most of us refuse to take the view that college professors must not be allowed to do their own thinking, and must not dare to give voice to their thoughts. You can't tie a man down entirely. But there are certain fundamental truths to which Methodists must be tied down. If they refuse—well, the world is wide. They can join other churches or found sects to suit themselves."

"This will leave room for thought and utterance, for it is essential that in all progressive bodies there must be freedom of thought and speech."

Dr. Carman's Future.
Another knotty problem that the general conference must face is the fate of Rev. Albert Carman, the veteran general superintendent of the church in Canada. While Dr. Carman is getting to be a very old man, there is no doubt to the loyalty to him felt by a large proportion of the church members. While many do not agree with all his views, there is a feeling that the church should retain him as long as possible. The suggestion will, no doubt, be made that his work should be eased by the appointment of an assistant.

The probability is that the gray-haired superintendent will not be asked to retire, or defeated in the election. It is pointed out that the Pope of Rome is never deposed. He rules till death removes him. So do Anglican and Roman Catholic bishops and archbishops. So do the Methodist bishops in the United States.

It is expected that the coming conference will be the most eventful held in the history of Canada. The prediction is made that almost all the clergy will be there, and that 90 per cent of the laymen elected to go will be in Vancouver for it.

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PRISON INMATES MAKE BOGUS COIN

Secret Service Men Bore Methods
of Massachusetts Prison.

Boston, Aug. 11.—How three inmates of the state prison at Charlestown were able to construct a counterfeit half dollar has been discovered by secret service officers.

Ever since July 21, when the state prison officials discovered that counterfeit half dollars were in circulation in the prison, and that some had got outside, an investigation has been in progress. At that time it became known that Patrick Hanley, of Lynn, who is serving a 25-year sentence as an habitual criminal, was involved.

Tonight it was announced at the office of the United States district attorney that two other prisoners, whose names were withheld, had been found to be accomplices of Hanley, and that the cases of all three would be presented to the federal grand jury next fall.

The counterfeiters obtained from unknown sources some scraps of tin and lead, a jeweler's crucible and some plaster of paris. One of the trio has a knowledge of electricity, and it was he who devised the means of melting the metal. He cut in on the electric light wires in Hanley's cell, attached two pieces of carbon and placed them on a small sheet of iron covered with fireproof cement. On the white-hot carbon the crucible was placed, the metal was melted and the coins were manufactured in a plaster of paris mold. It is suspected that there was an accomplice outside the jail who assisted in the distribution of the coins and the supplying of material for their manufacture.

SOME TRICK TO WING MAN BIRD

Gen. George W. Wingate Says
Riflemen Would Be "Up
Against It."

New York, Aug. 11.—General George W. Wingate, of Brooklyn, for 25 years president of the National Rifle Association of the United States, has been making a detailed study of the chances which an aeroplane would have in time of war against a corps of skilled sharpshooters. He sums up his conclusions in the following statement:

"In shooting at an aeroplane moving with a rapidly increasing speed, and darting up and down and suddenly changing its course in much the same fashion that a swallow flies, a rifleman, must accurately determine its distance, direction and speed."

"This is so different from ordinary rifle shooting that only those riflemen who are familiar with the use of shotguns know how a rifle should be aimed to hit an object moving in the air, and the sighting of a military rifle is so absolutely different from that of a shotgun that very few of those who actually know what they ought to do are able to do it with any certainty."

While I myself have often fired with a rifle at large birds flying, I can recall but one hit.

"The army is introducing shooting at moving objects, which when carried out will work a reformation in this respect. But even then, and assuming that the sights on the military rifles are simplified so as to permit it to be done rapidly, it must be some time before any large number will become proficient."

"The ordinary soldier, however, skillful he may be in shooting at a mark with the fine sights which he is accustomed to use and in doing which he takes his time, would become helpless when undertaking the sort of firing necessary to bring down a man bird."

VIOLINIST HELD UP

Made to Play and Fatally Beaten
When He Stopped.

Buffalo, Aug. 11.—Because he stopped playing his violin in a vacant lot late last Sunday night, Jacob Kizozo was so battered and kicked that his injuries today resulted in his death.

The police, seeking his assailants, gave out the story today. Kizozo, who was a laborer in the daytime and a dance hall violinist at night, was crossing a vacant lot, homeward, after midnight, when held up by several men, who ordered him to take out his violin and play.

Kizozo played softly at first, many popular airs, then louder, hoping to attract the attention of some passer-by. Pausing a moment in the weird midnight, when he was brutally pounded and knocked down. Then, yanked to his feet, he was ordered to continue. He played until exhausted. Further blows were rained upon him, and he was left helpless.

It was morning before he was discovered and removed. His skull was fractured. He told of the assault and described his assailants, who are supposed to have been intoxicated.

MARITIME BY-ELECTION.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Aug. 11.—The by-election in the Canilgan district of P. E. I. yesterday for the Provincial Legislature, resulted in a victory for J. A. Dewar, the Conservative candidate, over H. Wilson, the Liberal standard-bearer, by a majority of 30.

The result leaves the political situation in the island unchanged, the standing of the parties being: Liberals 16, Conservatives 14.

HAND PAINTED HATS FOR SMART SET

New Fad Very Popular Among
the Society Leaders of
London.

London, Aug. 10.—Ostrich plumes—always an expensive item of woman's millinery—are gradually growing more and more valuable. During the last three years the price of these feathers has risen 50 per cent, is the information imparted by a west end merchant. A feather that a few years ago cost only \$50 is now worth \$75.

"The ostrich feather is the most fashionable feather this year," he said, "and very few other varieties are worn. More ostrich feathers have been sold than ever before, and in consequence the ostrich farmer is prospering. Double the number of feathers are now being sent into the market, and many of the large plumes are so much sought after that several feathers have to be used to make a plume of the required length, thickness and width."

"We are making one form of feather nearly two yards long in some cases. I can arrange to have the crown of a large hat. Other large plumes are sold in sets of three. The most fashionable colors are shaded greys, chin-chilla, which will be worn on chin-chilla toques in the winter, and blues, from royal to navy. But the large plumes are so much sought after that several feathers have to be used to make a plume of the required length, thickness and width."

"As for the reason of their popularity and increased cost, ostrich plumes have had a great vogue this summer in Paris, and, of course, Paris rules in the fashion of millinery modes. Moreover, more women in England wear feathers than in former years, and now the ostrich feather trade is not confined to the best milliners. There has been a great increase in the demand for the cheap feather of the small tradesman."

"American women, too, have helped to make plumes more expensive. At the April auction one-half of the whole quantity put up for sale was purchased by American buyers to take over to the United States. Fewer feathers therefore were left for the English market, and the demand now being greater than ever, ostrich plumes are bound to become even more expensive. However, many ribbon and flower trimmed hats a woman possesses, she must have some plain hats, and as that is recognized as the correct wear for smart occasions."

Hand-painted hats are also becoming something of a fad with the smart set. They are made in soft white felt, with beautiful flowers and foliage, feathers or any other kind of ornamentation painted on them. Oil colors are used, and, according to Heath's, the Oxford street hatters, the headgear is to all intents and purposes indestructible.

"We have one," the manager said, "which is covered with great red decorative poppies, and they are painted so realistically that they really look like freshly-gathered flowers. An ordinary flower-trimmed hat can only be worn a short time by the well-
