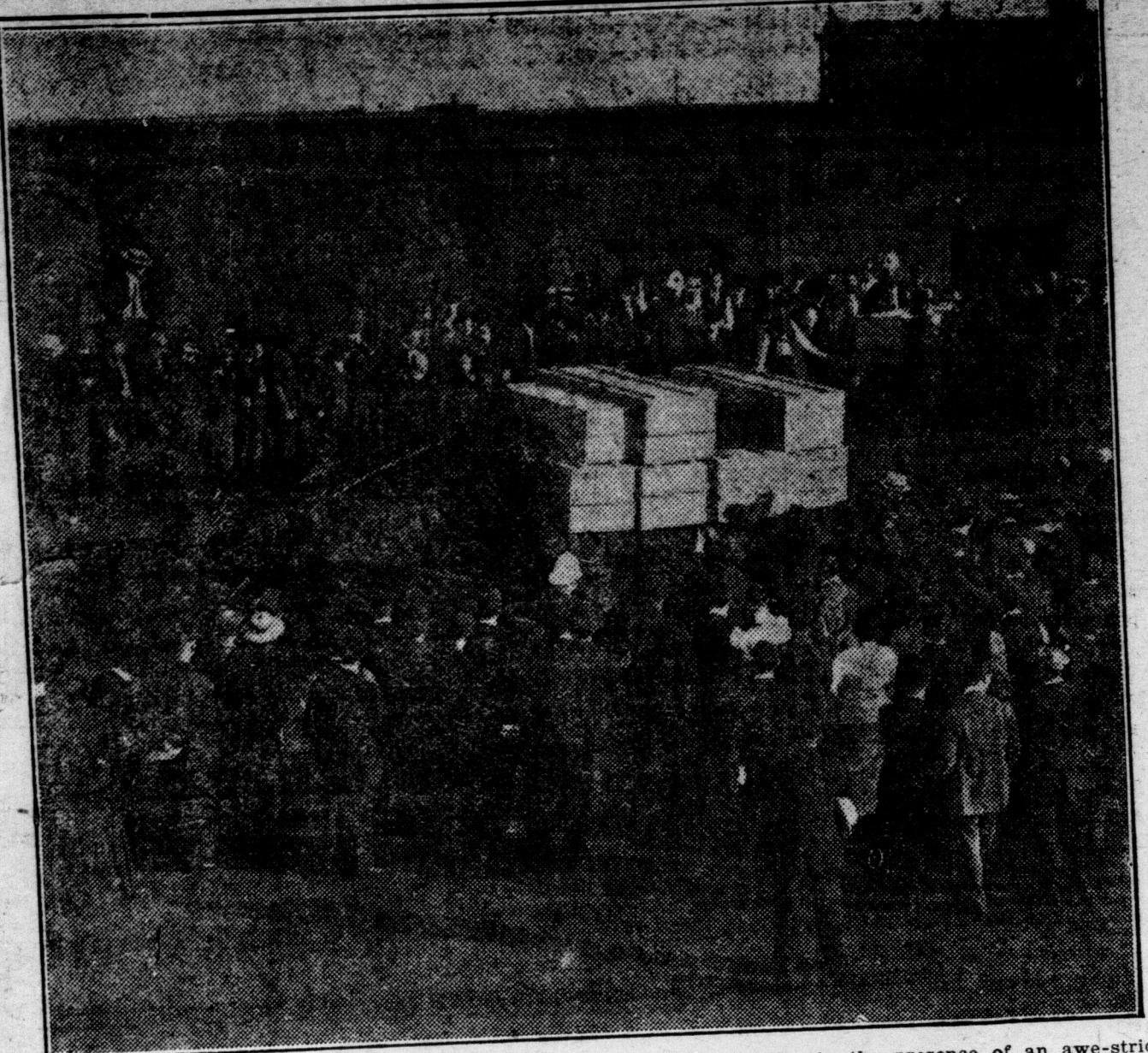


Arrival At Union Station, Toronto, of First Bodies of Empress Victims

LITTLE GIRL INSANE AFTER BEING BRUTALLY ASSAULTED

WINDSOR, June 3.—Because his alleged victim's mind has been affected by his attack, Frank Kazol, who is said to have attacked a 14-year-old girl of Ford City, Ont., the latter part of April, is today a free man.
The little girl suffered a severe nervous collapse the day after she appeared in court to make the complaint against him, and has since completely lost her mind, which, it is feared, she will never recover.
Until she regains her sanity, there is no law on the statutes of Ontario, under which Kazol can be prosecuted, and so he has been allowed to go on his personal bond to appear when wanted.

BAPTISTS OPPOSED TO BAR AND MILITARISM

Strong Resolution in Support of Leader Rowell's Party—Want Advanced Measures.

GODERICH, June 3.—The following resolutions were unanimously passed to-night at a very largely attended meeting of the Walkerton District Baptist Association.
"Whereas we worship a God of purity and sinlessness, and whereas we believe that our Christian duty is to promote and support organized effort to oppose impurities and sinfulness, therefore be it resolved that we, the delegates to the Walkerton Association of the Baptist Church, apart from any political bearings, desire to express our deepest appreciation of N. W. Rowell in his vigorous and persistent efforts on behalf of advanced temperance legislation.
The policy of aiming at the abolition of the bar in our province is truly in accord with the wishes of our people. We trust the day may not be far distant when we shall be privileged to see the fulfillment of our desires in this regard."
Militarism was discussed at some length, and the following resolution passed:
"Whereas it is our full belief that the avowed aim and legitimate end of all the Christian purposes and efforts in this line in the name of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, is that all people of the earth may dwell together in bonds of peace, and whereas the spread of militarism continues to make startling progress, therefore, be it resolved that we deprecate the existence in our midst of anything calculated to incite and develop the military idea in the boys and youths of our country, and we strongly urge that some steps be taken to check this progress. We pledge ourselves to support all worthy schemes aiming to promote peace in the world."

LONDONERS AT CONVENTION

PUBLICITY CAMPAIGN PLANNED FOR OXFORD

County Council Names Committees to Push Project—Moral Reforms Urged.

WOODSTOCK, June 3.—The principal business transacted at today's session of the county council was that that body went on record as being in favor of starting a publicity campaign for the county.
A committee comprising Councillors Sutherland, Denton, Pullin, C. Carroll, Stauffer and Warden Appell will interview the city council of Woodstock and town council of Ingersoll to secure their co-operation in the matter.
The general opinion was that the County of Oxford was one which they need not feel ashamed to advertise, and that it would be a good proposition to go ahead with it, as the Government has promised to pay one-third of the cost.
Renew Agreement.
Another special committee was also appointed to wait on the city council of Woodstock for the purpose of conferring with it in regard to renewing the agreement which expires at the end of the present year.
A delegation from the Children's Aid Society and the North Oxford Women's Institute, headed by Rev. Mr. Pedley, waited on the council, requesting it to put itself on record that children should be kept off the streets of villages and towns in the county at night, and that no one should be allowed to employ a boy under 10 years of age or a girl under 16.
Arousing Sentiment.
The idea was to arouse public sentiment in the matter. They realized that the council had no authority to do anything, but felt it would carry weight if the fathers of the county put the sign of disapproval on it.
E. L. Sutherland spoke on the question at some length and wound up by saying that he was heartily in favor of the movement and was in favor of granting a franchise to the ladies, so that the "abolish the bar" policy of Rowell would be carried.
Councillors Denton and Sutherland were appointed to go to Toronto tomorrow to interview the Minister of Public Works in regard to some question in regard to the good roads movement.
A grant of \$100 was made to the Twenty-Fourth Regiment.
The council adjourned at 3 o'clock to pay their annual visit to the House of Refuge.

NOTE IN BOTTLE TELLS VERY GRUESOME TALE

Uncovers Mysterious Loss of Henry B. Smith in November.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., June 3.—From a crumpled piece of paper, bedagged with grease prints, can be worked out the story of the fate of the Henry B. Smith, which left Marquette in the teeth of the terrific storm of November last, and was never heard from again. The paper was picked up in a bottle by surfmen from the Vermilion life station and reads as follows:
"Sunday morning—to the Hawgood Company, Cleveland, under please for ward, The Henry B. Smith broke in two opposite Number Five hatch about twelve miles east of Marquette. We are having an awful time. (Signed), Oliver."
Not a soul was saved and only one body was every found, that of the chief engineer, whose corpse was washed ashore near Michipicoten, on the Canadian shore, and found by Indians this spring.

ABOLITION OF THE BAR IS PARAMOUNT ISSUE

GALT, June 3.—The following announcement, duly signed, is made by the ministerial association of the town of Hespeler, express our conviction that the paramount issue before us today in the province of Ontario is the abolition of the traffic in drink.
"We, therefore, urge upon the electors in our churches to attend the convention of the political parties to which they belong and use every possible influence to secure the nomination of candidates who will pledge their support to a policy which does not stop short of the abolition of all bar and club licenses, and whose character and record are in harmony with such a policy.
We, therefore, express our determination to support only such candidates in the coming election regardless of party, and to use every influence we may have to secure their election.
"We would respectfully yet with deep earnestness call the attention of all Christian people to the great responsibility resting upon them in the privilege of the vote, and would express our conviction that it is a plain Christian duty to support only those candidates who are in harmony with such a policy as that outlined above."
