Teachers Should Have Been Long Ago, Says Inspector C. B. Edwards.

The proposal of a government pension scheme for all school teachers, brought into the House yesterday, is something that has been looked forward to by London school teachers for years. "It's the proper thing. It should have been done years ago," declared Inspector B. Edwards today. London started a pension scheme for its police department, the first in the country, by the way, and I think that we ought to have something similar for the

"In Ottawa they have a local scheme for pensioning the teachers, and one in Toronto. However, I think that the idea of making it compulsory and provincewide is the right idea.

Some five or six years ago I took up the question of a pension at a meeting been received, evidently from a British of the Teachers' Association, but at hat time the members said that they expected the Government to take up the question, and so declined to have to do with it seriously. \$1,600 as Board's Share.
