So States Bradstreet's Review of Situation.

London reports to Bradstreet's that there is little change in the trade situa-tion, except that spring prospects ap-pear more attractive as the season advances. Country produce prices are firm; the easier price tendency for eggs has been temporarily checked. Consump-tion of meats is rather diminished re-cently. This is partially accounted for by the influenza outbreak. Shortage of materials, particularly of stee! and ber, is evident throughout the west-peninsula. Stove manufacturers out a scarcity of steel sheets. With exception of industries that are unto get adequate supplies of mas operations are close to maximum

terials operations are close to maximum capacity.

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's that current trade among the wholesalers is of a satisfactory character, with evidences of an active spring season. Retailers are continuing the policy followed in January of clearing out broken lines of seasoned goods. Announcements of price sacrifices are conspicuous, and the reductions have stimulated business. In house furnishings, clothing, footwear, etc., trade has been reasonably active for this season. Wholesalers report that there is a lively demand for carpets, and indications demand for carpets, and indications coint to a good trade in this department n spite of stiffening prices, Industries are impeded by a shortage of semi-dished steel. Deliveries from United States points have been hindered by the car shortage in the producing areas, and the efficiency of the mills has been lowered. It is the exception rather than the rule that users of steel products or-dinarily secured from the United States, dinarily secured from the United States, are able to operate at full capacity under present conditions. Tin plate and galvanized and black sheets are particular, scarce, and there is little hope of relief for a number of weeks, Lumber orices are very firm, and stocks have been lightened by exportations to the United States, a large part of which are for the motor car industry. The lumber cut in Ontario is appreciably larger than that of last year, but this is not expected to have any effect on prices since there is bound to be a shortage in any event. There is little change in the market for country produce. Eggs have neen quoted at slightly higher prices. he live stock market is duller with a

The live stock market is duller with a slight easing in prices.

Representatives of the building trades met during the week and took steps to have prices of materials fixed on a stable basis, so that there would be no irregular fluctuations. The building program for the calendar year is likely to eclipse the 1919 record. The paint and oil market is taking on a more active tone, and distributors are preparing for a busy season, in which export g for a busy season, in which export ading is figuring. 
