'U' of Alabama a Good Place From Which to Pick Recruits

Sewell and Riggs Stephenson Were Among First Ten in the American To Get Over 20 Blows in First Month.

More evidence that the University of Alabama is a good institution from which to recruit players is furnished by a peep at the American League batting trial balance dated April 30, for during the first month of the campaign two of the eight Johnsonites who then struck twenty or more blows came from the institution that has so aided the Cleveland Indians in their time of need. Joe Sewell, who has finished his course at the Southern college, got 24 hits during April, and Riggs Stephenson, who hasn't got 23. Tied with the shortstop of the Tribe for the hitting honors in April is Harry Heilmann of the Tigers, who has always had an ambition to go to West Point, but never has gotten there.

Stephenson stood alone in making 23 hits during the month of showers. Sam Rice of the Nationals ranking behind him with 22. Nobody made 21 hits, but Tris Speaker of Cleveland, Ty Cobb of Detroit, Lawton Witt of Philadelphia, and Joe Judge of Washington, each got 20. Babe Ruth had to be content with 19. Nine of these batters picked up his Hammering Honor, at the close of the month, held one honor—that of making more long hits than any of his rivals. Babe singled nine times in April and spread 10 long hits on the greens of the various ball parks in which he played. Four of these were doubles, one was a triple, and five were for the full distance.

Battling Ruth for the extra-base hit laurels last month were two Clevelanders—Manager Tris Speaker and Private Joe Sewell—and one Washingtonian—Edgar Samuel Rice. Each of these men peeled off nine long hits. Rice got six doubles and three homers. Speaker and Sewell six doubles, two triples and one homer. Bob Veatch of the Tigers came through with eight walkups for additional distance, of which six were doubles and two were triples.

Two American Leaguers releasing seven long blows were George Sisler of St. Louis and Bob Meusel of New York (three doubles). Sisler of the Browns has started yet. When he does, there will be three famous Georges instead of two to keep track of. The others, of course, are George Herman Ruth of the Yankees and George Lange Kelly of the Giants.
