FORD DECLARES CLOSING ORDER IS NOT 'BLUFF'

Denies Reports That Causes
Other Than Fuel Shortage
Brought Action.

NOT RAIL STRIKERS

Rumor That Employees Ad-
vised To Assist Railways
Termed Ridiculous.

DETROIT, Aug. 29.—Reiteration
that Henry Ford was not "bluffing"
in his decision to shut down his big
automobile plants here on Sept. 16, as
part of a fight against what he terms
a "hold-up" on the part of coal brok-
ers, and denial of various reports
that causes other than the fuel short-
age were responsible for his action,
were made today at the Detroit
manufacturer's office.

A report from Louisville that when
the 75,000 Ford workers in the De-
troit district were released on Sept.
16 Mr. Ford would advise them to
take employment with the railroads
in an effort to break the rail strike,
was denied emphatically. The state-
ment was termed ridiculous.

"There may be individual cases of
employment making application for
work with the railroads," it was
stated, "but Mr. Ford certainly is
not going to advise the men to at-
tempt to break the rail strike."

Another report that met emphatic
denial was that lack of business fig-
ures in the decision to close the
plants. Figures were cited to refute
it. "When the decision to close the
plants was reached," it was stated,
"we were four weeks behind in or-
ders for Ford cars and three weeks
behind in orders for Lincoln cars. We
had only just caught up on orders
for trucks."

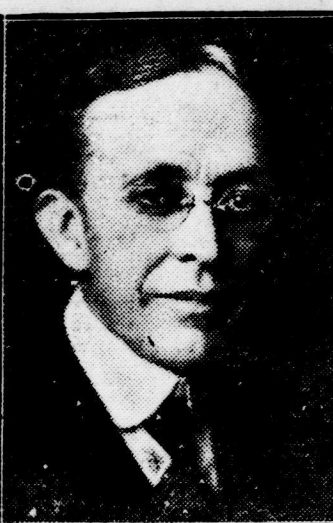
The decision to suspend operations
came, it was reiterated, at a time
when the Ford company was doing
the greatest business in its history.
Production showed 5,100 cars being
turned out daily against orders for
5,200 a day, it was pointed out.

A statement from Secretary Hoover
that present prices of coal would add
but \$1.50 to the price of Ford cars
also came in for sharp criticism and
the inquiry: "Does Mr. Hoover think
we should turn over to the profiteers
from \$7,000,000 to \$10,000,000 that
would be represented in the increased
cost of coal?"

There were no developments during
the day, it was said, to support the
hope that the shutdown could be
averted.

TURKS OPEN BIG ATTACK IN ASIA

Apparent Attempt To Force
Decision Before Coming
Venice Conference.

Constantinople Cut Off and
Ports On Black Sea
Closed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 28.—
The Turkish Nationalists are en-
gaging all their well-equipped troops
in a relentless offensive against the
Greeks in Asia Minor, in an appar-
ent attempt to force a decision be-
fore the coming Venice conference
with representatives of the allied
powers.

Before the Turks launched their
attacks against Arjunkarahissar
they had neglected nothing to make
sure of the success of their plan. All
ports on the Black Sea had been
closed to navigation, and railways,
telegraphic and postal communica-
tions with Constantinople had been
suspended. These measures gave the
first indications here that an offen-
sive was being planned.

The Kemalists, taking special care
to choke any information which
might possibly reach the ears of the
enemy, had even cancelled all per-
mits to Constantinople.

Up to the last moment before the
offensive started the Turkish troops
had been massed at points where
the bulk of their forces could be
brought into action. A number of
local actions and feinted offensives
had been carried out a few days be-
fore the offensive started, the idea
being to shatter the Greek front and
harness the Greek defenses. The
Turks made a number of surprise
attacks south of the Meander River,
resulting in the capture of a series
of villages. At the same time groups
of raiders crossed the river and car-
ried out a few successful operations.
Most of the operations were di-
rected against the wings of the
Greek army, although the supreme
effort of the Nationalists, according
to a communiqué, was being di-
rected against the Greek centre.

PASSES NEW YORK STATE FUEL BILL

Legislature in Extraordinary
Session Carries Measure
Without Dissenting Vote.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 29.—Without
a dissenting vote the New York Leg-
islature in extraordinary session to-
day passed the administration bill,
providing for the creation of a
single-headed fuel administration,
and an appropriation of \$10,000,000
to cope with the shortage due to the
coal strike.

Two days after the Legislature
had adjourned Governor Miller en-
acted the measure as law by sign-
ing the bill. In less than 24 hours
after the Legislature had been con-
voked in extraordinary session the
state was thus officially embarked
on a drastic policy of fuel control
to continue during the existent
emergency.

Under the authority of the new
law Governor Miller will, within the
next day or two, appoint a state fuel
dictator, armed with a maximum of
power to regulate the use, sale and
distribution of coal within the state,
with further power to control mar-
gins of profit, and to prevent profit-
eering and hoarding.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—(Can-
adian Press Cable).—Capt.
James Huxley, the famous
Antarctic explorer, with five
companions, says, a Reuter
dispatch from Sydney, Aus-
tralia, has called for Port
Moresby, New Guinea, for the
purpose of carrying on explora-
tion work for four months,
and will use two flying boats
equipped with wireless.
