
and the rest of the choral numbers were sung with precision and artistic finish. The choir was in excellent voice, and was immediately responsive to the direction of Mr.

George Sandford, director of the sun observatory project at Fairfield, announced the drop today. At noon Sunday the government thermometer stood at 63 above zero. At midnight it was 21 below. This, he said, was the greatest drop in 12 hours ever recorded by the United States reclamation survey during its history in this part of the state.

MAYOR WOULD CUT COMMITTEE PLAN

Predicts Better Business If the Council Boards Are Dropped.

Mayor Wenige does not want council committees, other than a committee of the whole, for 1925 municipal affairs. He is seeking to gather support for a scheme which would do away with permanent committees and permanent chairmen for mittees and permanent chairmen for the year. He plans on taking up the project with the new aldermen-elect before the inaugural meeting in Jan-uary, so that the council can get away to a flying start with all details

"There has been too much obstruction for committee reports," the mayor informed The Advertiser today. "On 70 per cent of the items recommended by one committee, the other committee, in council, has given opposition.
