These passengers had been taken on board at Liverpool. The officers of the Cephalonia were apprehensive that, with these people on board, the vessel might be quarantined for twenty idays at New York. By order, recently, of President Harrison, 40 second cabin passengers, who had no residence in the United States, had been previously put ashore by the Cephalonia at Liverpool.

London, Sept. 23.—The Marchioness of Abergavenny is dead. She was the daughter of Sir Harcourt John Johnston, of Sackness Hill, Yorkshire, and sister of the first Lord Derwell. She was married in 1840 to the Marquis, who survives her. They have had ten children, all living and intermarried with various leading families.

Unclaimed dividends are often forgotten by the people entitled to them. Some years ago a lady died at Marseilles, at the age of 98, who, though entitled to over £260,000 of the funds, was constantly in the habit of borrowing money. It is not sustomary to pay fractions of a penny on Government stocks, and in 1832 the amount of these fractions remaining in the treasury was over £750,000.
