THE POLICY OF PATIENCE.

The indignation against the Sultan in England has not subsided. The people are horrified at the atrocities that have been committed by his orders. They are, however, beginning to see that it would not be wise in Great Britain to attack the Sultan single-handed.

It is too much to say that the Sultan has made friends among the Powers of Europe. None of them like him and none of them approve of his methods. But they are extremely jealous of each other. They do not give the British nation credit for disinterestedness in desiring to snatch the Armenians out of the hands of the cruel Turk.
