Things quieted down into a condition of business such as has been witnessed in Wall Street for many weeks. The measures taken over night to clear the situation left little to fear. The agreement to allow the shorts in Northern Pacific to settle at 150 really went to the root of the crisis and wiped out the impelling cause of yesterday's panic. The announcement by the banks that yesterday's loans which had been provided by agreement amougst the leading institutions of the street would not be called today, kept the situation free from additional tension. During the day it was announced by some of the banks that loans which had been placed in yesterday's excitement had been voluntarily paid off by the borrowers today, and the collateral taken up and deliveries made with it. With these threatening conditions removed, a redound in prices was natural. The extent to which it ran was, however, a surprise and was attributed to various causes.
