

Dublin, Dec. 22.—James P. Farrell, Irish Nationalist member of parliament for North Longford, who has been advocating the boycott of certain individuals in the Longford Leader, of which he is the editor and proprietor, refused to give sureties for his future good behavior and was sentenced to the King's bench division today.
