WAS THIS A THREAT?

In discussing the late lamented tragedy in which Mr. D. J. House lost his life, a well-known citizen made the statement that the tragic horror was the direct outcome of Local Option, and remarked that "Mr. House is not the last one, there are others who will follow the same way as a result of Local Option."

WAS THIS INTENDED AS A THREAT?

Are we to understand from the above statement that if the citizens persist in upholding Local Option in the Town of Campbellton, a law which had the sanction of over two-thirds of our citizens, that they as such citizens, will be persecuted even unto death?

It is to be the meaning of the words uttered, the sooner the fight is again taken up the better for all concerned. The blood of the martyr is certainly the seed of any movement and while the life is so easily snuffed out, cries aloud for vengeance, we cannot afford to surrender our modest and decent before the altar of the "Red Rose."

This is now with us in the town. Are our right thinking citizens, the more than two-thirds who voted for this measure, to be found wanting? Surely not. Our beloved brother, whose life blood, so treacherously spilled, came from the ground into the highest heaven, gave his life for a cause he dearly loved, and we know that his death will be the means of stirring up such a feeling against the infamous traffic that every man who will be driven out of business. This ought to be done and in God's own time will be done, but the price of blood we have already paid seems too great.

Although there are at present no open bars in Campbellton, it is said that there are numerous places where liquor can be bought and many of these are places least suspected, and the people who are engaged in the traffic the last we would ever dream of being mixed up with such a law of the death, as was the case of the man who is now awaiting trial on so serious a charge. Many, no doubt, are tempted by the promise of large profits to be made, forgetting the fact that, even though they gain the whole world, they lose their own soul.

The question is being asked: "What are the Council and the police going to do about enforcing the Local Option law? Do the policemen know that liquor is being sold in Campbellton, contrary to the Local Option law?"

These questions from the citizens are superficial. The Council and Chief Hughes are fully alive to all the facts relating to the sale of liquor. The difficulties which confront them are: (1) Getting direct evidence of a sale; (2) the long delay provided for accused under the Local Option law. We believe that Chief Hughes is fighting a lone battle without the proper supports he ought to have; and any of our citizens who follow these matters closely, will see this borne out in the case lately tried in the courts, where a man was fined \$50 for selling as a waiter, a beverage, when the verdict in the street knew how many times this same man had been arrested.

This is where amendments to the present law are required and the time for action is NOW.

The sacrifice to the cause of temperance has been as we all know too great, and it is our duty and the duty of all good citizens to take a stand for what is true and upright and that this illegal traffic, which, if not stopped, will yet damn the town of our whole community, is driven from our midst. Will there be another martyr?

The temperance question is now very much to the fore, and this being the most vital question of the day, a question which affects the life of the whole community, many of our best citizens feel that something more must be done, than sitting weekly by and trusting to the law. Are the young men of Campbellton willing to do their share in this great work of cleansing the town? If so then there is a proposal on foot to form what will be called the "Bruce Memorial League." Each one desiring to become a member will promise on his own personal honor not to use intoxicating liquor and to discourage the use of it among his friends and acquaintances.

Already a number have signified

their willingness to do this and one desiring to join in this movement can send their name to the Editor of the "Graphic" who will forward it to the proper quarter from whence they will receive a token. There will be no organized society at present, no one will be able to know who are members and who are not unless by their life and the promoters of the movement feel that they can trust the honor of the young men of Campbellton to do what they promise.

This society is especially for the young men. The shock of the great tragedy is still upon us and we believe that this is the proper time to bring forward the beginning of such a society. Will you join the movement? Will you persuade others by your example to interest others?

If the young men stand strongly for this, we shall accomplish more in one year than all the laws of the land would do in a decade. "Watch ye, stand fast; Quit ye like men." "Let us call to remembrance the great and good."

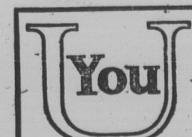
