Probably one of the most interesting of these letters was from Mr. J. A. Fowler, of Watford. He had just returned from Sunday School when the storm struck. The window in his room was open and before he could get it closed the room was filled with dust and the clothing flying in all directions. No one was hurt in his boarding house. He helped to take eight persons out of a nearby building. A little boy and his mother were saved, the rest killed. Mr. James Hindson's beautiful house was in the storm centre and was completely wiped out. The family were all in the house at the time except Harry, Mr. Hindson and Fred started for the cellar but before they got there the house was a wreck.
