THE DEADLY FOG The circumstances of this greatest dis-aster in Canada's maritime annals were dramatic in the extreme. As the Em-press steamed down the river the fog thickened, and after she took the mails aboard off Rimouski, Captain Kendall, whose first voyage in command it was, decided that the better course would be to lie to till morning. 
