

EAST LAMBTON ENTRANCE RESULTS

Two hundred and thirteen Entrance candidates wrote at the various examination centres in East Lambton and of this number one hundred and eighty-three were successful. This makes a record of 86 per cent. successful, which is the best record for many years. The papers of candidates who failed by only a few marks were carefully re-examined by the Board.

The answers given in history by the majority of the students were excellent, showing that this subject has received careful attention throughout the schools. The geography paper seemed to be the most difficult, and the examiners would recommend that more attention be given to map study. Many candidates seemed to have very hazy notions as to the location of important places on the outline map.

The names are given in order of merit. Those who have obtained 75 per cent. or more of total marks have passed with honors. Park Steadman of Petrolia stands first in East Lambton Inspectorate with a total of 653 marks, while Stanley Trenouth of Watford Public School is second with a total of 647 marks.


