Ratepayers of Glencoe voted on a bylaw to raise by debentures of the corporation \$2,500 to purchase a new gasoline fire engine and \$1,000 to construct cement storage tanks for water. The bylaw carried with a majority of 6 votes, there being 63 for and 57 against.
