

of good wheat at Naples is 2s 10d sterling a bushel or 67c. From any one of these places might be obtained at 23 cents per bushel on the spot, and 12 cents per bushel on wheat, or about 1/2 the rate charged on transportation of the same from Rochester, and one fourth of what is charged from Ohio. Fifty thousand bushels of corn lately received here from Ohio by one route, at a freight of 40 cents. The duty on flour is 2 dollars per barrel, and on wheat 25 cents a bushel, but there is a duty and may be imported to advantage. The countries of Europe and the United States afford stores of bread stuffs almost inexhaustible, so that the supplies for this country, if they could run to the highest possible quantity, could be affected by a very slight degree. Free trade will supply all our wants, and the cost with a small mercantile profit, will not carry prices above 9 cents for wheat, 100 cents for rye and Indian corn, 50 cents for oats per bushel, and \$7.50 for or per barrel. So let the depending cheer up, no one who is industrious and frugal need starve 1836 or 1837. — N. Y. J. Commercial.

CORN.
Bread stuffs have hitherto constituted one of our principal articles of export, amounting in 1831 to within a small fraction of \$12,000,000. In 1835; (we speak in both cases of the commercial year, ending 20th Sept.) the quantity was reduced one half, and the value of bread stuffs imported was only \$31,116. The year ending 30th of the present month will show still smaller exports of these articles and larger imports. And we are, we are, from present appearances, all very possibly show an amount of imports equal to the exports. Should the corn crop be cut off in the northernmost States, as it is now very liable to be, by the early appearance of frost, the extraordinary phenomenon will probably occur, of the greatest grain growing country in the world becoming dependent upon foreign countries for a portion of its bread. — Ibid.

VERY LATE FROM ENGLAND.
We have been favoured with the Liverpool Times of the 23d August by JAMES DOUGLAS Esquire, and by the packet ship Pennsylvania Smith, who arrived at New York on the 21st inst., from Liverpool, whence she sailed on the 24th August, having brought Liverpool papers to the above date and London to the 23d ult., from which the following interesting extracts are made. The English Parliament was prorogued on the 20th August.
The news from Spain, (says the Liverpool Courier of August 24) is more than usually important. Another change has taken place in the Ministry. The constitution of 1812 has been proclaimed at Madrid. It is impossible to say to what further misery and distraction this ill fated country is destined. The feeling in favour of the constitution of 1812 is much too liberal to be recognized either by the Queen or by Don Carlos, a third party will thus spring up in the heart of the nation, and while the two belligerents are spending their strength in hopeless efforts to put an end to the war, may step in and snatch the prize from both, or at least prove very troublesome to whichever may gain the ascendancy.

STAMP DUTIES.—The newspaper stamp duties have been amended in the House of Lords, by the rejection of the clauses requiring the names of proprietors to be registered. On its being returned, with the amendments to the House of Commons, the Chancellor of the Exchequer moved that the bill be laid aside, which was agreed to. He then introduced another bill precisely similar to the first except that the registration clauses were omitted, which was read on the 10th August, and on the 11th read twice and passed. It was then sent up and passed in the House of Lords on the 12th.
A conference was held on the 11th upon the municipal corporation amendment bill, the object of which was to advise the Commons of their Lordships reasons for insisting on amendments rejected by the Commons. The conference came to have dissolved without any conclusion or agreement.

The corporate property bill for Ireland, was read twice in the House of Lords on the 15th. Lord Lyndhurst gave notice that in committee he would remove several of the clauses, and this declaration was considered as indicating the defeat of the bill in the upper or lower House.
The Jewish civil disabilities bill was read a third time and passed in the House of Commons on the 16th.
The registration of voters bill was thrown out in the upper House.
The church temporalities bill for Ireland was read in the House of Lords on the 16th.

On the 16th, in the House of Commons, Mr. Hume called up a petition from the House of Assembly of Upper Canada, and moved a resolution after some severe strictures upon the conduct of Sir Francis Head that "the government of that province ought to be conducted by H. M. Lieutenant Governor, by and with the advice and assistance of an executive council, composed of men possessing the public confidence, and whose opinions and policy should be in harmony with those of the people, as declared by a majority of their representatives in their House of Assembly." &c. &c. Sir George Grey warmly defended the conduct of Sir Francis, and Mr. Hume withdrew his resolution.

EXTENSIVE FIRE IN LIVERPOOL.—The large warehouse of Messrs. Sands, Hodgson & Co. at Laverpool, has been destroyed by fire. The loss of stock is stated in some accounts to be a thousand bales, but we learn from undoubted authority that but 500 bales were consumed.

LIVERPOOL.—On Tuesday last, the noble hall of a new ship built for James Rait Esquire, was launched from his premises, and received the name of "Ann Crichton." We have heard many who are competent judges, pronounce very high eulogiums on the materials, workmanship and symmetry of the vessel; which must be very gratifying to Mr. Walker, the master builder. By the new method of calculation the Ann Crichton measures 606 tons. She is to be commanded, we understand, by Captain Bowker.

The Court of Common Pleas and General Sessions of the Peace was opened here on the 20th inst., Chief Justice Wynn presided. Upwards of 30 causes were entered for trial, 18 of which were disposed of, the greater number of these having been tried.
Judge Parker will hold the Court of General Jail delivery here ordered for next Tuesday—See the High Sheriff's advertisement.
LECTURES ON CHEMISTRY.—Of all the Sciences which tend to elevate the mind and invigorate our conceptions of the most wonderful and most interesting phenomena of nature, Chemistry, next to the sublime science of Astronomy, takes the chief place. To the manufacturer and the artisan it is all important, and the study of this science possesses the peculiar advantage that while it instructs it also entertains. The Rev. Dr. McCulloch of Pictou is now engaged in giving a course of Lectures in this Town, and we should think that it were only for rational amusement to lounge and a halt in the evening could seldom be better employed than attending these lectures.

We understand that a gentleman of the name of Henderson has been appointed Collector of His Majesty's Customs at Campo Bello, and is now on his passage thither.

1st. You are to play and wash your Engine once every month, as long as the season may permit, and any Fireman neglect his duty in this case, he shall forfeit the sum of 2s. 6d. for every such default.

2nd. If any Fireman do not appear at his Engine before it is brought to the place of playing, he shall pay 1s. 6d.

3rd. If any Fireman be not present when the list is called, he shall forfeit for every such default 7s. 2d.

4th. You are to repair to your Engine House at the first notice of fire, either by the ringing of the bell or by cry; or take your Engine and leading hose to the place of fire, and work the same according to the directions of your Engineer or his assistant, and be sure that the same who takes the pipe or leader does not quit his place under penalty of 2s. 6d. for each such default.

5th. If any of said Firemen absent themselves before they are discharged by their Engineer or his assistant or by the foreman of the Engine, he shall forfeit for every such offence the sum of 2s. 6d.

6th. If any Fireman have notice of fire, either by the ringing of the bell or by outcry, and desisting by the way that such fire is extinguished and comes not to the Engine House to see all things put in their proper places, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of 3s. 2d.
