Goodspeed will be Tried for Attempted Murder of His Guard.

The preliminary examination of Fred Goodspeed on the charge of attempted murder has not yet been held. It will take place some time before the September sitting of the circuit court, when, if sent up for trial from the lower court, the prisoner will come before Mr. Justice Landry, who presided at the trial of Frank Higgins for the murder of W. J. Doherty. Goodspeed was the chief witness against Higgins.

If Goodspeed is found guilty on the serious charge that is made against him he will doubtless be sentenced to a long term of imprisonment. The law dealing with the punishment of the crime with which he is charged is section 232 of the criminal code of 1882, which says: Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and is liable to imprisonment for life, who with intent to commit murder by any means whatsoever wounds, or causes any grievous bodily harm, to any person.
