OBITUARY

MRS. LESLIE H. BANKS.

Her many friends will learn with surprise and deep regret of the death of Julia, beloved wife of Leslie Banks, formerly Miss Julia Corbitt, of Bridgetown, who on Sunday, September 14th, passed away at the home of her grandmother, Mrs. J. M. Elliott, Lawrencetown, at the early age of 21 years.

During the pastorate of Rev. N. A. MacNeill, Mrs. Banks was baptized and received into the membership of the Bridgetown Baptist Church. She was deeply interested in the activities of her church, and was a member of the choir and a teacher in the Sunday School, until May 1912, when she married and went to live in New Glasgow. During the month of March in the following year she contracted a severe cold which settled on her lungs, and for weeks her life hung in the balance. But through the skill of physicians and the best of care she recovered, and during the Summer seemed to gain back something of her usual health. In the hope that a change would benefit her, Mrs. Banks came to Lawrencetown in October, and enjoyed fairly good health during the winter. But when March came again she was taken ill with pneumonia, and this with the shock of the sudden death of her infant son, John, was more than her weak constitution could stand, and in spite of all that medical skill and loved ones could do, she gradually failed. On Sunday morning as the gray dawn of a new day was coming, with a farewell message to her father, and a good-bye to loved ones at her bedside, she raised her hand and said, "Jesus take me," and then passed on to the brighter home above.

During her sickness Mrs. Banks was a great sufferer, but with Christian fortitude and rare sweetness of disposition, she bore it all without a murmur, expressing regret only for the trouble she made for those who ministered to her—to them a labor of love.

Everything possible for her comfort was done, and every care was bestowed upon her by her devoted mother. Mrs. Banks leaves a sorrowing husband, mother and father, a sister, and an aged grandmother, beside a large circle of relatives and friends to mourn their loss. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place at the home, on Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 15th, and was conducted by Rev. Mr. Melick, assisted by Rev. F. J. Armitage. She was laid to rest in Pine Grove Cemetery beside her infant son. The floral offerings were many and very beautiful.
