The Report of the Committee on Communications was taken up, and, after slight alteration, adopted, as follows:

Your Committee, appointed to consider and report on the various subjects which should be embraced in the various Communications to this Session of the Grand Division, beg leave to report:

That the only Communication which has been submitted to consideration is one from the Secretary of the Provincial Club of Temperance Watchmen of this Province, the purport of which is to ask the attention of the Grand Division to the consideration of the "desirableness and practicability of establishing a Provincial Temperance League, combining all the various Temperance organizations in the Province."

Your Committee are of opinion that such an organization is desirable for the promotion of the general interests of Temperance; and that it is the duty of the G. D. to aid and encourage such a movement by all means in its power.

Your Committee are further of opinion that the whole question as to the time, the propriety, and the mode of organizing Provincial Temperance League, to embrace, if possible, every temperance organization in the Province, should be submitted to the approaching Clerical Temperance Convention, which is to be holden at Halifax, on the 4th August next.
