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## a TRRILLING SCEVE, ILLISTBATING TE.YPERATE DRINAING.

Permit me to illustrate my views of temperate drinking, hy relating substantially a thrilling scene, which occurred in a town in a neighbouring state, while the people were gathered together to discuss the merits of the license question, and decide infounally, whether neightors should any longer be permitted to destroy each other by vending alcoolic poisons.

After a moment of silence, and all eyes being fixed upon her, she stretched her attenuated body to its utmost height, then her long arms to their greatest length, and raising her voice to a shrill pitch, she called upon ali to look upon her. "Yes!" she said, " look upon me, and then hear me. All that the last speaker has said relative to temperate drinking, as being the father of all drunkenness, is true. All practice, all experience, declares its truth. All drinking of alcoholic poison, as a beverage in bealth, is excess. Look uyon me. You all know me, or once did. You all know 1 was ance the mistress of the best farm in this town. You ail know, too, I once had one of the best-lite most devoted of husbands. You all know I had five noble hearted, industrious boys. Where are they now? Doctor, where are they now? You all know.You all know they lie in a row, side by side, in yonde. charch-yard; all-every one of them-filling the drunksrd's grape! They were all taught to believe that temperate drinking was safe.-excess alone ought to be avoided;
and they nerer acknomiedged excess. Thiny quoted you, and you, and you, pointing with her shred of a finger to the Priest, Deacon and Doctor, as authority. Thry thought themselves saff under such teachers. But I saw the gradual change coming over my lamily and propects witi dismay and horoor; I filt we were all to be overwhelmed in one common ruin; 1 tried to ward off the hlow; I tied to break the spell-the delusive spell-in which the idea of the benents of temperate drinking lad involved my husband and sons; 1 hegged, I prayed, but the odds were greatly against me. The Priest said the poison that was destroying my hushand and boys was a good creature of God; the Deacon (who sits under the pulpit there, and took our farm to pay his rum bills,) sold then the poison; the Physician said that a little was goort, and excess ought to be avoided. My poor husband and my dear boys fell into the snare, and they could not escape, (there were no Washingtonians then, ) and one after another was conveyed to the dishonored grave of the drunkard. Now look at me again-you probably see me for the last time-my sand has alinost run.I have dragged my exhausted frame from iny present abode -your poor-house-to warn you all-to warn yon, Deacon! - to warm you, false teacher of God's word"-and with her arms high llung, and her tall form stretched to its utmost, and her voice raised to an unearthly pitch-she exclaimed, "I shall soon stand before the judgment seat of God-I shall meet you there, you false guides, and be a swift witnees against you all." The miserable female vanished-a dead silence pervaded the assemhly-the Priest, Deacon and Physician hung their heads-the President of the meeting put the queation-shall we have any more licenses to sell alcoholic poisons, to be sold as a beverage? The response was unaniunous-No! Penple of the United States, friends of humanity every where, what would have been your verdict had you all been there also?
This picture may be thought to be overdrawn, but could the history of families be told in this city, in all of our towns and villages, or in our hamlets, tens of thousands of cases equally striking might be recorded here.
