U.N. HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES No. 53/67

Text of a statement made on October 26, 1953, by Mr. S.D. Hemsley of the Canadian Delegation to the eighth session of the United Nations General Assembly, on agenda item 28 - work of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

I should like to thank the High Commissioner for his clear and persuasive statement on the work of his office.

After our statements in the Third Committee I need hardly assure the High Commissioner of the appreciation that the Government of Canada has of his work. We know he is endeavouring to carry out very difficult and far-reaching responsibilities and we would not like to see any step taken that would have bim in fulfilling the responsibilities with that would hamper him in fulfilling the responsibilities given him by the Assembly. We, therefore, have a great deal of sympathy for the position taken by the distinguished delegate of the Netherlands.

I must, however, revert to an earlier statement, repeated this afternoon, by the distinguished Chairman of the Advisory Committee in which he mentioned that a tight the Advisory Committee in which he mentioned that a tight budget is a good budget; and that if the Secretary-General (in accepting the cuts recommended this year) found himself in any part of the budget in a difficult position, he could rely upon a sympathetic hearing from the Advisory Committee. For this reason I am tempted to vote for the recommendation of the Advisory Committee. I will, however, reserve our Position until we have heard further from the High Commis-sioner before voting; for no doubt in his concluding state-ment, the High Commissioner will wish to give Ambassador Aghnides' comments full consideration. 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Note - The Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions had recommended cuts of \$58,000 in the 1954 budget estimates of the Office of the High Commissioner for Refugees (\$743,000). The High Commissioner was unable to convince the Fifth Committee that the recommended cuts would hamper him in the discharge of his important responsibilities. The Advisory Commit-tee's recommendation for a total administrative budget of \$685,000 was approved by 40 in favour (including Canada) and 5 against, with 4 abstentions.
