colleagues, that Canada should play a greater part in inter-allied arrangements for the conduct of the war and for post-war planning.

Building upon the work of his predecessors, Robertson not only made sure that there would be no obstinate "cork" in the decision-making process, he also laid the basis for the team-work

which produced the "golden age" of Canadian diplomacy in the decade after the war. Developments during that period will be dealt with in the second volume of the history, *Coming of Age*, 1946-1968, co-authored with Donald Barry of the University of Calgary, which is in preparation.

## **OUCH! THAT PINCHES!**

Treasury Board President, Robert de Cotret, announced government-wide expenditure reductions. Some of the initiatives directly affect EAITC including:

1. Expenditure reduction of \$10 million in 1990-91, with an additional \$5 million each year up to and including 1993-94;

2. Designation of the passport office as a new Special Operating Agency;

3. Cost recovery to be increased for certain immigration services together with CEIC;

4. Decentralization arrangements with CIDA will be reviewed; and

5. 20% reduction of government-wide international travel.
