Supply—Resources and Development totalled 769,000, which was up 20 per cent from the previous year.

I thank the hon. member for Peterborough West and the hon. member for Rosetown-Biggar for what they have said about the film board and in particular about the proceedings of the committee, which I had the privilege of attending and which I thought was an especially good one.

Mr. Fulton: May I ask the minister whether he can give us any information on a subject which I am sure is of interest to all the people of Canada-and which was referred to in the press about a month ago, I think,concerning a documentary film depicting the part played by Canadian forces in the 1914-18 war? I confess immediately that I am not familiar with the details, only having read them in the press. My recollection of the statement made there was that this was a film compiled by the old government film bureau, as I believe it was called, made up of extracts from the best of the documentary films of many countries during that war, and that it was made available to branches of the Legion or any others who might be interested. We have been given to understand by press stories that practically every existing copy of the film had been worn out, that there was only one left, and that it was in bad shape.

film and to preserve it in order to indicate to this and other countries the tremendous and valuable role played by Canadian forces in the first war. It appears that no other complete record exists.

Mr. Winters: I believe the picture in question is called "Lest We Forget". It is a stirring picture. I have seen it. The film board has done a considerable amount of work in rehabilitating the sound track, and it is going to be retained as an archival picture and can be reproduced by the film board.

Mr. Fulton: Will it be?

Mr. Winters: Yes, it will be.

Mr. Fraser: In 16-millimetre size?

Mr. Winters: It can be reproduced in 16-millimetre size. There is no immediate request for it at the moment, but it can be produced in that size.
