

Business of Supply

Motion for Concurrence agreed to, bill read the first time and ordered to be printed.

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Béchard): When shall the bill be read a second time?

Some hon. Members: By leave, now

Hon. C. M. Drury (President of the Treasury Board) moved the second reading of Bill C-185, an act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money for the public service for the financial year ending March 31, 1970.

Motion agreed to, bill read the second time and the house went into Committee thereon, Mr. Béchard in the chair.

The Deputy Chairman: Shall clause 2 carry?

On clause 2.

Mr. Drury: The appropriations requested in this bill are intended to provide for all necessary requirements of the public service up to June 30, 1969. In no instance is the total amount of any item being released by this bill. The form of the bill is the usual one for interim supply bills. The passage of this bill will not prejudice the rights and privileges of members to criticize any item in the estimates when it comes up for consideration in committee, and the usual undertaking is hereby

given that such rights and privileges will be respected and will not be curtailed or restricted in any way as a result of the passing of this measure.
