Due to a Ship disabled, how the Master may act ditto
To a Ship failing after the Time agreed on, either arriving safe, or meeting Loss ditto
To be paid only on a Ship's Return, was discharged, tho' she was not loaded Home 111
Agreed for a Ship to load at another Port, and on her Arrival there, nothing is put aboard her, is yet due ditto
