taxes upon the people of England +. While the British feamen were confuming, on board our men of war and privateers, foreign ships and foreign feamen were employed in the tran portation of our merchandize, and the carrying trade, fo great a fource of wealth and marine, was entirely engroffed by the neutral nations. The number of British thips annually arriving in our ports was reduced 1750 fail, containing 92,559 tons, on a medium of the fix years of war, compared with the fix years of peace preceding it; and the number of foreign ships had increased 863 fail, containing 85,678 tons *. The ships remaining
