NORTH TORO. TO BAND HELD FINE CONCERT

Funeral of Late Mrs. Wright Takes Place To-day—Suburban Happenings.

NORTH TORONTO, April 24.—(Special.)—The second annual concert of the Toronto Citizens' Band, held in the town hall, was an unqualified success. The crowd was a good one, but not so large as the merits of the performance would have justified.

In each of the numbers rendered, and there was generous provision, the band gave evidence of splendid training and good hard conscientious work. Bandmaster Dawson was in charge, and he was warmly commended for his good work.

The assisting artists, among whom were Mrs. W. P. Hewitt, Miss Lilian Dent, Miss Florence Morton and Messrs. Charles Stanley and J. M. Dawson were encored again and again. Altogether it was the best musical concert ever given in the town, and it will be most regrettable if arrangements are not completed so that the citizens will be enabled during the coming summer to hear this fine musical association in a dozen or more consecutive concerts. It will add immensely to the pleasure of living in the northern town and no slight difference of opinion as to the financial arrangements between the council and the band ought for one moment to stand in the way. With all due respect to the former they can well afford to be a little more generous in the matter, and the citizens will strongly support them in so doing. The town cannot afford to take any retrograde step.

NEW LADY PRINCIPAL

Miss Harriet Walsh to Become Head of Bishop Strachan School.

A distinguished graduate of Trinity College, Dublin, Miss Harriet Walsh, B.A., has been appointed lady principal of the Bishop Strachan School in succession to Miss Acres, who resigned a year ago, owing to ill-health. During the interim the school has been making excellent progress under the able administration of Miss Nation, the vice-principal and both she and the strong staff will remain to assist the new lady principal.

Miss Walsh, who is the daughter of the Ven. Robert Walsh, D.D., Archdeacon of Dublin, and granddaughter of a former vice-provost of

Trinity College, Dublin, has a distinguished academic and teaching record. After winning honors in the Dublin University, she entered at the University of Cambridge upon the special course of study prescribed for those who wish to qualify for specialist standing as teachers. In this course she was eminently successful. After two years spent in the study of French and German abroad under university professors in the two countries, Miss Walsh returned to England and entered upon her professional career as a teacher. In 1903 she was appointed assistant mistress at Uplands School, St. Leonards-on-Sea, and a year later head mistress of the same school. Under her administration the school made rapid progress. The wide scope of the work done is amply attested by the official recognition granted to it.

Miss Walsh is expected to arrive in Toronto in August, and will enter upon her new duties with the re-opening of the school early in September.

100 Refrigerator Cars.

MONTREAL, April 24.—(Special.)—During the last four weeks the Angus shops of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Montreal turned out 100 refrigerator cars—an average of six each day. All of the cars were of the standard C.P.R. dimensions, weighing approximately 40 tons each. Fifty of the cars were fitted up with ventilators in the roofs, and were equipped with the C.P.R. pan-system of cooling. The other fifty were equipped with the ordinary tank system of cooling. Most of these cars are already in service, so great is the demand for them.

Slumber Chairs in Parlor Cars.

MONTREAL, April 24.—(Special.)—A new style of parlor cars will shortly be put into commission by the

C.P.R. The new car will be of standard size and weight, but the interior will be arranged in a novel manner.

One end of the car will be built like the observation cars now in use, while the other end will resemble the ordinary vestibule car. Inside the car will be furnished with mahogany and will be equipped with heavy slumber chairs upholstered in dark leather, and cast-iron raised or lowered.
