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EXPECT DEMPSEY TO BE SHORT ODDS CHOICE

And Half Million Dollar-Purse to Match Up the Heavyweight

New York, Dec. 19.—If Cochran, Rickard or any other promoter tries to bring Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier together he will hear terms that will make him think he has invaded the movies and is trying to sign Charley Chaplin and Douglas Fairbanks to work for twelve months. Carpentier is unquestionably one of the most popular and picturesque figures in any phase of public life today. And he is not likely to understate his drawing power.

Dempsey, on the other hand, is the heavyweight champion of the world. Consequently he will hardly be likely to consider accepting a cent less than the challenger is paid, and will in all probability demand considerably more.

Whoever finally signs Dempsey and Carpentier will have to be ready to expend about \$500,000 promoting the fight. The fighters will unquestionably work \$100,000 between them, and perhaps more. If Jack Dempsey is to fight, he will quickly and show at the same time that he is a good sportsman, he should propose to Carpentier that he will make a winter-fight-all-basis. This would make the match the greatest of ring history in many respects.

If however, Dempsey is guaranteed \$250,000 and Carpentier \$200,000, then Jack should offer to bet his end. Carpentier could readily make up the difference in the amount if even money was paid.

If by any chance the bout be staged in this country, the Dempsey would be at least a 2 to 1 favorite. The odds might be as great as 4 to 1.

That Dempsey can and will defeat Carpentier few will doubt over here. He outwitted the Frenchman by more than twenty pounds, he is just as fast and a much harder hitter.

Cal's Lynch to Beat Wilde in February

Well, Jimmy Wilde is not so superlative, after all, says a New York writer, who sees only points scored by slugging. He goes on. Jack Sharkey, the west side boy, who is a good fighter, but not a champion by any stretch of the imagination, gave him a sound thrashing in Milwaukee the other night.

Sharkey was in good form, and since he was never threatened by the little welterman during the bout, he went like a house after him, against the possibility of a knockout.

The British lightweight's showing was not so good as the one he gave Sharkey. It was not so much that Sharkey was far too good for him as it was that Wilde wasn't anything like the overseas fighter. He was just a little better than a local amateur.

In only one round did Wilde outpoint Sharkey, and that was the sixth. Even then, during a fusillade of blows that Jimmy landed, Sharkey dropped his hands and let Wilde believe him that he had. The New Yorker was not even dazed by the blow.

To be the winner he was when he landed here, Jimmy has a lot of work cut out for him.

The stories told by Young Rosner, Joe Lynch and Pat Moore, that Wilde was not the man that the British said he was, has been borne out by the fact that by Wilde's showing against Sharkey.

Joe Lynch should beat him when they fight at the International Sporting Club in February.

Bob Martin Scores K.O. in First Round

Battle Creek, Mich., Dec. 19.—Big Bill Brennan, the champion of Camp Custer, who has boxed draws with Bombardey Wells and other well-known heavyweights, met the same fate that befell all opponents of his when he was slugging A.E.P. champion, in their scheduled ten-round bout here this afternoon, staged in honor of General Kelly, who was visiting the camp.

Brennan lasted but one minute. He would have gone earlier, but the crowd jostled him into trying to win with him a few seconds.

The round had hardly started before Brennan was dropped for the first time by a blow on the jaw. Struggling to his feet, he sank back again from a punch in his right side. Finally, a show was over, with two minutes to go for the only round fought.

It was Martin's second knockout within a week, the first victim being Arthur Kelly, whom Bob dropped at St. Louis.

CARPENTIER FOR ITALY; WILL GIVE EXHIBITION

Milan, Dec. 18.—The Sporting Gazette announced today that Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion of Europe, has accepted an invitation to come here between February 25 and 28 to give a sporting exhibition at a boxing carnival, the proceeds of which will go as a benefit to the Italian Olympic Games committee.

The motion pictures of the match in which Carpentier recently defeated Joe Beckett at London will be shown. Carpentier will be accompanied by Lacner, who acted as his training partner during the former's training in Paris. Carpentier also will spar with an Italian champion.

TECHNICAL KNOCKOUT

Battle Creek, Mich., Dec. 19.—Bob Martin, heavyweight champion of the American expeditionary forces, scored a technical knockout over Bill Brennan of Camp Custer, in the first round of a ten-round bout here this afternoon.

At 4 to 1 odds, Brennan failed to come out of his corner for the second round.

HIGHEST PRICES IN YEARS AT THE OLD GLORY SALE

The revised estimates show that in the recent Old Glory sale at the Garden in New York a total of 416 trotting brood horses were sold, at an average of \$2,520.00, or an average of \$564.80 per head, and one of the highest totals for 50 years. Of the sixty-one four sold over \$1000, five for \$1050 and one for \$1200. The twenty-seven others brought \$2000 or less, so that their general average made the best showing for many years. The unusual success of the sale, however, was shown by the unusually high prices received for what was ordinary stock or considered as such by active buyers, when the estimates show that the remaining 405 horses selling from as low as \$35 and less than \$1000, brought an average of \$234.50. This was hardly expected, compared with the same sale last year, when the general average for the total number sold, 428, was \$283, or only \$10 more than the average for the 1919 ordinary offerings.
