MORO STRONGHOLD TAKEN ON TOP OF HIGH MOUNTAIN

U. S. Troops Win Two-Days Battle—Artillery Hoisted by Block and Tackle.

Manila, March 9.—Major-General Leonard Wood, commander of the division of the Philippine, reports as follows from Jolo, capital of the Sulu Islands: A severe action between troops, a naval detachment and constabulary and native Moros has taken place at Mt. Dajo, near Jolo. The engagement opened during the afternoon of March 8 and ended in the morning of March 9. The action involved the capture of Mt. Dajo, a lava cone 2100 feet high, with a crater at its summit and extremely steep. The last 400 feet were at an angle of 60 degrees and there were fifty perpendicular ridges covered with a growth of timber and strongly fortified and defended by an invisible force of Moros.

The army casualties were fifteen enlisted men killed, four commissioned officers wounded and thirty-two enlisted men wounded. The naval casualties numbered thirty-two. The constabulary casualties were three enlisted men killed and fourteen wounded. All the defenders of the Moro stronghold were killed. Six hundred bodies were found on the field. The action resulted in the extinction of a band of outlaws who recognized no chief, has been raiding friendly Moros, and who, owing to their defiance of the American authorities, had stirred up a dangerous condition of affairs.

The artillery was lifted by block and tackle, a distance of 200 feet into position on the tip of the crater. Brigadier-General Bliss and myself were present throughout the action.

The officers and men engaged highly commend the Moro constabulary, who being seventeen out of the force of forty-four engaged.

It is impossible to conceive a stronger natural position than that attacked.

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YORK LOAN SALES TO DATE.

\$60,000 Realized so Far—Southern Light Company Prospects.

About \$60,000 have been realized from the sales already made by the National Trust Company, Limited, as liquidator of the York Loan Company. There is no disposition to force the sale of real estate as values depend so largely upon what is done in regard to extending the street railway system to Rosedale-avenue.

It is now assumed that the entire district will be equipped with a proper sewer system, and with street railway service this property will be most desirable. As it is the houses are all rented to good advantage.

John Mackay, permanent liquidator of the Southern Light & Power Co., is carrying on business and supplying power to factories and private consumers at Eridania and Parkdale. This power is generated by steam, and it has not yet been decided whether or not to complete the extensive works begun by the company for the generation of electric current by water power.

The National Trust Company, Limited, is hopeful of a very successful liquidation, but the result is largely contingent upon the street railway extension.

Three Murders Tried. Baltimore, Md., March 9.—It was possible that three murder trials, may take place at the same time, which opened at the Baltimore City Court today.

Mrs. Susan McDonald, charged with poisoning her husband-in-law, may again be indicted.

Adam Lloyd is charged with causing the death of his wife, who was found in a chair with her clothes on fire, the prisoner alleging that he returned from the barn after doing the laundry and found her in that condition.

The other murder case is that of Ferdinand Klingebiel, who killed his wife on Monday last.

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"BLACK HUNDRED" AGITATES FOR MASSACRE AT EASTER

Deputation Waits on Premier Witte Expressing Alarm—Measures Taken to Prevent.

St. Petersburg, March 9.—The fears of the renewal of Jewish massacres at Easter, to which a deputation recently called Premier Witte's attention, appear upon investigation to have real foundation.

The "Black Hundred" organizations are conducting an agitation to elicit the "enemies of Russia." Circulars have been prepared in St. Petersburg calling for the extermination of the Jews. At Minsk the society of old believers had the temerity to address a petition to the premier for permission to persecute the nation's Jews.

The premier immediately notified the governor-general of Minsk to take measures to prevent any outbreaks. Nevertheless, in many places reactionary officials and police who regard the Jews as the "enemies of the state" are proceeding under the cover of patriotism and love for the empire.

The members of the deputation which called on the premier were genuinely alarmed. The appeal which they presented to the premier, charged that the Jews are the "enemies of the state" and that they are proceeding under the cover of patriotism and love for the empire.

The local authorities, the deputation added, are closing their eyes with the result that the Jewish population is threatened with more and more outrages than those of last fall.

FAMINE IS APPALLING. Canada's Agent in Japan Says Millions are Starving.

Ottawa, March 9.—In a report to the trade and commerce department, Alexander Maclean, Canada's commercial agent in Japan, writes that the famine conditions as described in official statements, are appalling.

Private munificence is doing its best to relieve the distress. It is said that the Japanese government is sending millions of dollars to the famine-stricken provinces.

Imperial and provincial authorities are busy trying on public works employment to relieve the distress.

DEATH SENTENCE COMMUTED TO SHORT TERM IN PRISON. Trenton, N. J., March 9.—The sentence of death upon Mrs. Antoinette Tolia, the Bergen County murderess for the killing of Joseph Souza, was today commuted to 7-12 years.

The votes stood 6 to 2. Mrs. Tolia was to have been hanged in the electric chair on Monday, March 12.

This is the first time that the court of pardons has ever commuted a death sentence to other than life imprisonment.

IN DEFENCE OF CANADA'S SPIRIT

Sir John Beverley Robinson Writes Strong Letter to New York Paper.

The following letter from Sir John Beverley Robinson of New York appeared in The New York Herald:

"Many Canadians, like myself, have read with much interest and some indignation the Canadian Northwest in recent issues of The Sunday Herald.

"At the same time I wish to protest against some statements in the letter from Winnipeg last week.

"What may have been the dim future as to the political relations of Canada to this country no one can foresee, but we are all entitled to an opinion. As a Canadian, and one who knows Canada well, I am confident that no annexation sentiment, to any appreciable extent, prevails in any part of the country.

"I will go further and challenge the writer to point out any one constituency where a candidate for either parliament or a provincial legislature could on an annexation issue, win a majority of the votes recorded. In fact, he could not be nominated.

True to Old Flag. "No doubt there is at present a large emigration from this country to Canada, and I hope may continue, but if your correspondent will make a careful canvass of some of those American settlers who have lived long enough in the country to be able to give an intelligent opinion, he will find that they are living under the way of law and order are maintained.

The writer states that there is a large French element in Toronto and in every town east of the great lakes. To this I reply that the majority of the streets of Toronto for months and, also, almost any town east of the lakes, including Hamilton, have a large majority of English, Kingston and through the country to Ontario, and, until he approaches the border of the Province of Quebec, he will probably never hear the French language or meet a French-Canadian.

"I strongly protest, also, against the statement that 'if the western Canadian found he could add a dollar to his pile he would join the annexationists.' Emphatically this is not so. If a Canadian is anything, he is a loyal British subject and quite as patriotic and no more likely to change his nationality than any good citizen of this country, and can I put it in any other way?

Our Prosperity. "Canada owes her prosperity to her own people up to this time, and while no doubt the influx of farmers and others from this country is of much benefit to Canada, still, should they cease to go it would not retard her great future. She has progressed steadily and by her own efforts and because of her great natural resources. Americans are going there simply because they wish to share in this prosperity, and I believe the large majority of them have no desire to interfere in the internal affairs of a contented and prosperous people, quite content with their present form of government."

Commenting editorially The Herald says: "He is undoubtedly right in most of the statements made in his interesting letter, including the assertion that Americans in Canada have no fault to find with the flag they are living under or the way law and order are maintained."

Our Winnipeg correspondent, however, was discussing not political but economic tendencies, and as Sir John admits, the future is uncertain and we are all entitled to our opinions."

Natural Science Ass'n Meeting.
