NOW UP FOR BIGAMY.

Young Woman Acquitted of Man Killing Arrested Again.

Montreal, July 5.—(Special.)—Miss Tracy, nee Eva Beard, who was acquitted last evening at Sweet'sburg by the coroner's jury of the charge of murdering Howard, is once more under arrest. At the inquest Eva Beard, the admitted slayer of Howard, gave her age as 26. She was alone in her home with her two children when Howard came in, she said, and he asked where her husband was. She told him Ed was in the garden washing the wagon. Howard looked thru the window and said "Ed is coming." She went to the door to look out, when Howard rushed at her with open arms, she grabbed the first thing to hand, which was a gun, she told him, and unless he got out she would tell Ed, and when he came towards her again she leveled the gun and fired. When he fell she ran to Mrs. Gleason's. She declared she had married Ed Tracy at Richmond, Vt., five years ago, but knew that he had another wife living. She had been told that Mrs. Gleason knew the deceased, and declared that he had previously tried to assault Nancy Whitehead, Emma Beard and Floyd Wood.

NEGRO BOY TO HANG.

Youth of 17 Convicted of Criminal Assault on White Women.

Baltimore, Md., July 5.—Wm. Lee, a colored youth of 17 years, was tried in the circuit court here to-day and sentenced to be hanged in Somerset County for criminal assault on two white women six weeks ago. He confessed his crime.

Lee fled to Virginia and was brought here to escape the vengeance of a mob which had assembled in Somerset County. The feeling in that county continues to be such that it was deemed unsafe by the authorities to take him there to be tried, and for that reason the trial took place in this city. He will be taken to Somerset County to be executed.

A Bedfordshire Veteran. J. Fleury of New York City is a visitor to the city, who is of special interest to veterans, residing here of the 16th (Bedfordshire) Regiment, in which he was born, his father having been a sergeant. He came to Canada with the regiment in 1866, and yesterday was the first time since that he again met Captain Nunn of the Army and Navy Veterans. Bugle Major Swift and the Q.O.R. bugler entertained Mr. Fleury, who to-day will meet a number of the Bedfordshire men. On Tuesday evening he will be presented at the regular meeting of the veterans and will be enrolled as a member.

War Among Chinese. Philadelphia, July 5.—Twenty-five Chinamen were arraigned before a magistrate to-day for examination concerning the factional war in Chinatown last night, during which Frederick Poon, an Episcopal missionary, and three Chinese, were shot.

WOMAN'S WORLD.**Cushions for the River.**

Cushions are an absolute essential to comfort on the river. The newest and most attractive are those of linen adorned with an applique border of flowered cretonne. A good bold design is selected, and the pattern of roses, trails of lilies or chrysanthemums—as the case may be—is cut round, leaving a spare quarter of an inch of material at the edge. The design is then basted on to the cushions square, and button-holed all round so as to bind the raw edge of the cretonne. Washing silk or cotton with a silk finish is usually employed for this purpose, while the interstices between the flowers are frequently ornamented in addition with embroidered dots.

Some very pretty cushions for the electric launch were made of dark green linen, the border piped with pink, while a design of pink raned in cretonne was applique in festoons along the pillows. Some were round, while others were square and oblong, the latter taking the form of either festoons, wreaths or single detached bunches of the blossoms with their foliage.

Another very pretty effect was gained in the case of a set of butchery blue linen punt cushions and pillows, which were ornamented with a scroll-work design in blue of a lighter shade, carried out in cretonne, the monogram of the owner being embroidered in the corner of each, while others in red were successfully adorned with an artistic border of pink and white, outlined with button-holing in a dark shade of pink.

Perhaps the prettiest cushions are those covered with squares of linen slit at intervals to permit of the introduction of a broad band of ribbon, which is supplied with an ample quantity. One distinguishing color, but a multiplicity of shades, is the rule in each instance, while the design or monogram of the owner or the name of the house boat embroidered in one corner, is also a point which is never forgotten, the latter being carried out in cotton cord applique to the linen.

Talks on Hygiene.

One of the necessities of perfect health is that the skin perform its duties properly, and to do this the pores must be kept active and vigorous. The pores of the skin are very important avenues in eliminating the impurities in the blood, caused by improper diet, over-feeding or lack of exercise. When these impurities accumulate too rapidly for the skin to throw them off, the natural result is the appearance of blotches, blackheads, pimples, etc.

Consequently, it will be seen at once that the first thing necessary to a perfect complexion—that is, a skin smooth, fresh and of good color and free from discolorations and other defects—is that the blood be kept pure and vigorous.

The next point is that the pores of the skin be kept open and active, and that the skin be kept in a healthy condition. It is for this reason that the daily bath is a necessity to perfect health. For cleansing purposes take a warm bath, preferably at night, using plenty of good pure soap, and finishing with a cold shower or sponge, and a thorough rubbing with a moderately rough towel. The water should not be hot, however, else the bath may prove enervating.

Cold baths stimulate the skin, and many find friction baths helpful for the same purpose. Certainly, they are very delightful, making the body glow and tingle with vigor.

Friction baths may be taken with friction brushes or with rough towels, the latter being preferable if the skin be soft and sensitive. Simply scrub every portion of the body with the towel, using quick, free and moderately powerful movements. For the head, hold the towel at each end, pass it behind the head and with a saw-saw motion of the hands it will be an easy matter to reach every part. The skin will tingle and redden to a certain extent, but this is a good sign, showing that the circulation brought to the surface by the friction, and will soon become soft and smooth as velvet.

Dress Embroideries.

The latest eccentricity in the world of dress is represented by the use of embroideries which have, to a certain extent, taken the place of flowers. Garlands of strawberries and leaves with straggling tendrils are a favorite design, and these would be carried out in the style of a tailor costume in the same tone as that of the material.

With coats and skirts of coarse cocoa-colored linen, adorned with Japanese embroidery in several shades of blue, make a very effective combination. It is a noticeable point that almost any of the old embroidery is employed nowadays, and old Byzantine and Greek designs, such as the Venetian and Venetian patterns, are almost equally in evidence.

Sandals for Children.

Nothing is better for children's wear, especially in the hot weather, than the little leather sandals now procurable at any shoe store. They are cool and comfortable, and are not cramped nor do they distort. They may be worn with or without hose, as desired. In choosing the style choose those with the little upper there is set full on the sole, rather than those which are tight drawn, as the latter is likely to draw the toes upward.

Some housekeepers use salina while about their household duties, and say that once used to doing without it, they are delighted with it. In addition to ease and comfort, they do not allow the foot to tire as readily as do boots.

Garniture of Summer Dishes.

Summer dishes require more elaborate garnishing than those that are served in winter time, for in the latter the appetite is flagging and the food is less palatable. The knack of serving edibles temptingly and daintily must be brought into play to tempt the appetite. A point of proficiency easy to attain if one have a discerning eye and a little artistic result. Parsnips, an appetite for dainty results. Parsnips or crescent of lemon, fancy shaped pieces of bread tipped with parsley and decorated with grated egg yolks and slices of radish, cakes, discs, or diamonds of beef, all of these may be used to advantage in decorating summer dishes.

Caramel Ice-cream.

This is a California recipe, and makes an excellent iced cup of brown sugar, a

heated cup of milk and one teaspoonful of butter. Boil for three minutes and beat until stiff enough to spread on the cake.

At the Creche.

Reports presented at the board meeting at the Creche, Hayer-street, show that during the past four weeks 1107 children had been cared for, there being an average of 45 children, of all ages, in one day. The largest number in any one day was 71.

Summer Frocks for Girls.

Lawn, muslin, and linen represent the favorite materials for young girls' summer frocks, both for morning and afternoon, the only difference between those which are destined for best occasions and for single every-day wear depending upon the elaboration of detail. This is secured by a wealth of tucking, fine pleating, and encrustations of lace, or more elaborate garden-party frocks possessing an amount of fine needlework quite out of proportion to the needs of rapidly growing school-girls.

Narrow pill lineries and pin-tucking are seen on skirts and bodices alike, while short elbow sleeves are de rigueur. Altogether, the half-sleeved sleeve is supplemented with tight-fitting cuffs of broderie Anglaise or tucks lawn—a precaution which is always taken in the case of girls' frocks and is not yet out, both on the score of appearance and for motives of economy as regards long gloves.

A Color Note.

Wood-brown is the favorite color for the latest crin models in millinery, supplemented with wood-brown feathers in exactly the same tone, and these are worn by not a few women of unquestionable taste with cool dresses of water-green muslin. This alliance of brown and green—the colors which one associates with woodland nymphs and forest fairies—is looked upon as presage of the coming of spring, and is not yet out, both on the score of appearance and for motives of economy as regards long gloves.
