CANNOT TOUCH GRATUITY FUND

Board of Trade Has No Power to Make Any Distribution

And So the Proposition to Give Each Member \$125 and a \$25 Certificate Could Not Be Adopted—Dominion Parliament Also Has the Power—Many Members Express Themselves as Strongly Opposed to the Present Scheme.

No definite scheme was adopted at the meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon to settle the gratuity fund distribution either one way or the other.

The grant of \$125 and a \$25 certificate to each member of the board was the subject of a long and heated discussion.

President Gurney capped the meeting by ordering and plunging into business by stating that in the appointment of a trustee of the fund he had no personal end to serve.

Mr. Hood, who is opposed to the present course of the council, corroborated Mr. Gurney's statement.

Mr. Wilson of Dundas moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Campbell's scheme of equitable distribution.

Mr. Campbell was willing to adjust himself to Mr. Wilson's plan, but Mr. Wilson was not willing to do so.

Mr. Wilson proposed that the gratuity fund be distributed in five years, bearing 4 per cent.
