

The chairman said that the propose change was necessary from the standpoint of economy and efficiency. He ould make the architect chief of the would make the architect chief of the department, with a superintendent of the Cattle Market, a superintendent of St. Lawrence Market, and a superintendent at the City Hall, the latter position to be filled by Mr. Coatsworth position to be filled by Mr. Coatsworth at his present salary. Building Inspector Copping would be dismissed.
Ald. Hall moved that the recommendations of the chairman be adopted. Ald. Lamb thought that there was a prearranged scheme to rush the matter thru the committee, and he wanted to know more about it. He thought it would be extravagant to appoint a city architect, and the city would likely regret it. He further thought it would be unwise to change the present arrangements. The new scheme would create new positions, for whom he did not know, but he had heard that there was competition between a few alderwas competition between a few alder nen. He defended the City Commis-

doner. Circumstances Demand It. Ald. Hall appreciated the kindness of the Lamb in his sympathy with Mr coatsworth. He could not, however verlook the fact that altho Mr. Coatsoverlook the fact that altho Mr. Coals-worth had been a most competent serv-ant of the city, circumstances, for in-stance, Mr. Coatsworth's age, had in-capacitated that gentleman from being able to perform the numerous duties which were imposed upon him, and de-manded a change as early as possible. manded a change as early as possible.
