STRONG ANTI-FOREIGN FEELING. Apprehension as to Safety of Missionaries in Morocco.

London, Oct. 24.-The English missionary, Mr. Cooper, who was murdered at Fez, Morocco, recently, had a wife and two children there, and there is considerable apprehension as to their fate, as well as that of four other women missionaries. It is known that there has been a considerable recrudescence of anti-foreign feeling. Letters from the Kansas Mission of Mequinez, composed of twelve Americans, describe the situation there as critical. More recent telegrams from Mequinez, however, indicate that the rising of the Berber tribes has been suppressed.

London, Oct. 24.—Earl, Cadogan, the ex-Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, entertained his tenants and the employes on his estate at Bury St. Edmunds to-day. He said he could not forget the generous demonstration on his departure from Ireland, and added: "Those who are supposed to represent Ireland in parliament do not really typify the feelings and desires of the Irish, who, owing to the prevalence of agitators, appear to all nations far worse and less Christian than they really are."
