## HARDIE ATTACKS OUR IMMIGRATION

Famous Socialist Leader Says We Are Draining Old Land of Best.

Toronto, July 22.—"England today has not the material for an army of the old standard."

The speaker was an elderly Scotchman, with a slight burr in his speech, but with a powerful and impressive delivery. The Canadian Club turned out well to hear him, for he was none other than Keir Hardie, M. P., leader of the British Independent Labor party, who addressed them at McCone's today.

Mr. Hardie's talk was socialistic from the start, but he was applauded again and again as he described the work out of the Independent party, the majority of whose members are Socialists.

"Whether you agree or disagree," he said, "Socialism is a factor to be reckoned with both in the old country and here."

Mr. Hardie reviewed the Social Nationalistic movements in England, Ireland and Scotland, and dwelt on the tendency of the people to try to preserve their national language, literature and traditions. He spoke in particular of the Scotch annulars of Bannockburn, of the different Covenant battles, and other old national events. From this came the movement of the people.

"Experience has shown us," said Mr. Hardie, "that there is much tyranny and misgovernment under a change as there is under a king. The changing of a figurehead without altering the constitution is a waste of time. Experience has taught us this. At this moment preferential trade or protection pure and simple is a dead letter."

"But while trade is fairly prosperous at present I can easily imagine a time when millions will be ground in poverty. Then the arguments of the protectionist party will sway the people, and, perhaps, change the party votes."

"The advent of the Labor party was some 16 or 17 years ago, when the work began. But at the last election when 30 members of the party were returned, the country woke up to a fact the existence of which they had overlooked."

Mr. Hardie then briefly ran over the feelings antagonistic to the party when its success began, adding, with a humorous glance at the reporters: "It is surprising how ignorant an enlightened press can keep the public."

Emigration to Canada and the colonies was fiercely attacked by this leader of the people.

"Canada, with the other colonies beyond the seas, is drawing away our hardy Highlanders, and people of the country, from whose ranks our armies were drawn, but now we must look to the cities, where we find the physical standard is low."

"Out of 11,000 volunteers for the South African war, 1,800 only had physical sufficient for the army stand. Now we have not the material for an army of the old standard."

"The physical condition is due to poverty, and because the people are underfed."

"There are 25,000 school children in London who go to school hungry in the morning and stay hungry all day."

"The first thought of the party," he explained, was to provide these suffering children with one square meal a day at public cost. It was this poverty that induced men to emigrate."

"I don't object to a man emigrating if he does it freely," said the old man, "but I do object to his being compelled to migrate," and a fist swung through the air in emphasis.

Next to the children's movement no party is trying to improve conditions so that men can get work, and lastly to provide an old age pension for those who are now compelled to go to the poorhouse.

"What we want," he said, "is food for the children, work for the strong man, and comfort for the aged."

(Cheers.)

Socialism is the only way to bring them about according to this leader of the people. His claim for it is, that it is now a movement amongst the well-to-do workers and businessmen, and claims two members of the House of Lords as followers. There are 2,000 to 2,500 meetings every week, where socialism is preached, and the leader of the Labor party is sure that it will encompass the world.

The leader of the British Independent Labor party, Keir Hardie, M. P., for Merthyr-Tydfil, is en route for Australia via Vancouver, and will go to Yokohama and India first. Mr. Hardie has been in poor health.

At the King Edward last night, Mr. Hardie told the press something about the vigorous party which he leads in politics.

"We represent the working classes," he said, explaining the difference between this party and the Liberal faction. "The Liberal party represents the capitalists," he added.

## BLAME LAID ON FOREIGN HORDES

Police Com'r Bingham Says Immigrants Commit Terrible Crimes.

New York, July 21.—Theodore A. Bingham, police commissioner, aroused by the waves of crimes against women and children throughout the greater city, with especial reference to the Dyker Heights case, made the following statement carefully revised to the newspaper men at police headquarters, after saying that the people of New York did not realize what an enormous amount of crime the police department is facing:

"There is another very important thing about this crime business. I don't want to say anything that would be indiscreet, but unquestionably the hordes of immigrants that are coming here have a good deal to do with crimes against women and children."

"You will notice that these particular crimes are done by fellows who can't talk the English language. It is this wave of immigration that brings to New York the hundreds of thousands of criminals who don't know what liberty means, and don't care, don't know our customs, cannot speak the English language, and are in general the scum of Europe."

"The solution of the problem is to prohibit immigration. But when we come to executing immigration laws it is found to be practically impossible to do so."

"The failure of the grand jury of Queens county to indict that man Becker for the attack on that little girl at Elmhurst has made people of his stamp bolder. The failure to indict excites great surprise over here, and I don't understand it."

In reply to a question as to why he did not get more policemen and also as to whether he would suggest to the mayor that a special meeting of the board of estimates and apportionment be called to provide funds for the 1,400 extra policemen already asked for, the commissioner said:

"Why, there is nothing to say about that. It seems to me to be wiser to wait until along in September, when the city fathers are nearer home and have begun to consider the budget. What the newspapers tell now will be forgotten by the end of September."

When Bingham was asked if he thought the failure of patrolmen to properly patrol their beats was in any way responsible for the crime wave that has swept over New York, he said:

"No, I don't look at the matter in that way. There are a lot of cops who never patrolled their posts properly."

## TWINS FALL INTO SEWER AND DROWN

Whirled to Their Fate Before Startled Companions Can Give Alarm.

Philadelphia, July 21.—Clasped in each other's arms, George and Herbert Shiref, twins, 10 years old, residing with his parents at No. 3215 Irving street, fell into an open sewer at Fifty-Second and Lombard streets Saturday and were swept into the Schuylkill River and drowned.

The youngsters, with a number of companions about the same age, had been playing on a lot through which the sewer runs, and after a heavy shower the kids ran to the bank to look at the water rushing through the river.

Creeping close to the edge of the bank, Herbert lost his balance and fell a moment before the other. His brother, seeing his danger, rushed forward, and just as he threw his arms around Herbert the earth on the bank gave way.

Without a chance to cry out, the twins were precipitated into the swollen, torrent, and their little forms whirled like corks in the raging flood. Before help could be summoned they were swept through the opening toward the river.

The boys' companions notified a policeman of the accident, and he sent in a hurry call for the police boat. The crew of which watched the exit of the sewer at Pine street, but no trace of the bodies could be found. Grappling hooks were procured, and the police recovered the body of Herbert. They are still searching for the other.

## LACKS A LEADER.

New York, July 22.—A letter has just been received at the headquarters of the board of foreign missions of the Presbyterian Church from one of the medical missionaries of the board, now in China, describing the conditions around Canton. According to Dr. J. M. Swan, the writer of the letter, only a leader is necessary for a widespread rebellion in that part of China. He says that certainly before twelve months have passed a decided change in the Government may be expected, and that whether it will be accomplished by force of arms or not is yet to be determined.

## NEW CHURCH CANON.

Rome, July 22.—The commission appointed to reform the canon-law has voted a canon restricting the nullification of marriages by the church to cases of appealing circumstances. The commission, however, reserves the right to decide later whether or not the power of nullification be suppressed altogether.

## TO PUNISH THOSE WHO LIBEL CANADA

One Circulator of Malicious Statements Is Fined \$200 in Alberta.

Toronto, July 21.—The department of immigration is anxious to put a stop, if possible, to the frequent statements sent out from Canada by disgruntled immigrants, unreliable press correspondents and others to the press of Great Britain, the United States and other countries, libeling Canada in respect to climate, the hardships of immigrants, etc. Some of these stories, particularly those sent out last spring as to conditions prevailing in the Canadian west, were wildly sensational and of the wild and woolly variety. They are almost totally unsubstantiated by facts and are calculated to seriously injure Canada's reputation abroad.

The first prosecution of these willful slanders of the Dominion has been reported to the department. In January last G. A. Hoagland, of Taber, Alta., had printed in the United States circulars and fraudulent advertisements warning Americans that laborers were not wanted in Canada. The matter was taken up by Immigration Commissioner J. Obed Smith, of Winnipeg, and the League Board of Trade and a prosecution was begun by the Attorney-General of Alberta.

As a result Hoagland has been fined \$200 for occasioning injury to a public interest.

The matter will be further looked into by the Minister of Justice and legislation may be introduced at the next session of Parliament to impose a substantial penalty on anyone who willfully and publicly slanders Canada.

## CLAIMS STAKED BY HUNDREDS

Gold Found in a Pittsburg Park Causes Wild Stampede.

Pittsburg, July 21.—Only the intervention of the police prevented an army of children and some adults from doing themselves bodily harm in a stampede to stake off gold mining claims in Arsenal Park Saturday. The park has just been purchased from the Government by the city, and for over half a century has been a Government military reservation.

This morning Louis Group, aged 18, of Howley street, found two battered pieces of gold, which, upon expert examination, proved to be worth \$40. The news quickly spread, and in a short time the park was overrun by children with spades, hoes, picks and all manner of equipment and diligent excavations were undertaken, in various sections of the park.

Even women and men scrambled in efforts to stake off claims, and a special detail of police was hurried to the scene to prevent disorder. Between 200 and 300 people were finally permitted to try their luck.

Emmet Kenna, aged 14, of 2537 Leach street, found a small gold "nugget." The park proved to be rich in lead ore. Hundreds of bullets were uncovered which had undoubtedly been grounded during a half century of rifle practice.

In 1862 a violent explosion in the cartridge factory on the arsenal grounds killed many people and blew the buildings and all its contents into fragments. It is believed that the gold found today was battered and buried by that explosion.

## PLOT TO WRECK KOREAN THRONE

Another Sensational Conspiracy Unearthed at Seoul, the Capital.

Seoul, July 22.—The discovery of a plot against the throne resulted in the arrest between midnight and dawn today of one of the elder statesmen of Korea, together with Pak Yung Ho, the Japanese appointed minister of the imperial household, Yi Do Chai, grand chamberlain of the former emperor, and four Korean officers.

The intervention of the former emperor in the affairs of today is evidenced by the fact that he prevailed upon the present emperor, to refuse his signature to a proclamation framed by the cabinet, the object of which was to calm the people and restore order. The appointment of Pak Yung Ho to his present post is another evidence of the refusal of the deposed sovereign to surrender power, and there is reason to believe that he is planning to precipitate an outbreak on his own reserve.

The ministers of war, justice and education were assembled at the palace at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The remainder of the cabinet joined them at 10 o'clock in the evening. The full cabinet deliberated until this morning.

The minister of war has reported to Marquis Ito, the Japanese resident-general, that he has no control over or communication with the army. The former emperor is responsible for four anti-Japanese conspiracies since his abdication. The first conspiracy consisted in ordering the imperial guard to rush the palace on the night of July 19. The second is found in the defiance of the minister of war by the Korean army. The third was the attack on the police station at the Great Bell, which the Japanese have proof to show was led by an army officer, and the fourth consisted in his direct manipulation of the functions of the present emperor.

The Japanese residency here has generally placed the whole responsibility for the arrests on the throne, disclaiming intervention, which it is asserted, would be an unnecessary invasion into the affairs, which are purely Korean.

Reinforcements of Japanese troops are not expected until July 24, and it is impossible to adequately patrol the whole city so as to prevent the gathering of the mobs which have assembled during the last two days.

## DESERT GUIDE WEDS HEIRESS

Syrian Declares He Is Engaged to Daughter of Illinois Millionaire.

New York, July 22.—From Said Kallil Haek, a few weeks ago a traveler's guide in Syria, now here planning to become an American alien, came the statement today that on Wednesday of next week he will marry Miss Elsie Ellwood, daughter of Isaac L. Ellwood, of De Kalb, Ill., steel wire millionaire and business associate of John W. Gates.

Said Kallil is alone in his assurance that the wedding will take place. The grandfather of the girl, Isaac Ellwood, who is at the Waldorf-Astoria, was the only one of the girl's relatives who would discuss the subject at all tonight. Miss Ellwood is at her home in De Kalb and from there it is reported that she laughed at the story and that her relatives there unanimously put Said Kallil in the Ananias club.

W. L. Ellwood is on his way to New York to penetrate the Syrian quarters and get an explanation from the former guide.

Despite the fact that he seems to stand all alone in the matter, Said Kallil was positive tonight that the marriage would take place in De Kalb next Wednesday. The Syrian said he met Miss Ellwood when in the capacity of dragoman he was looking after the tents and donkeys of the party with which she traveled through Syria recently. He came over to New York with some of the party, including Miss Ellwood, last week and at once set about the task of becoming a citizen.

Just at present he is living in the Syrian quarter, which is far removed from Fifth avenue, and there to a reporter who discovered him he had no hesitancy in relating his desert romance.
