DR. CHISHOLM CALLS MINISTER NAMES

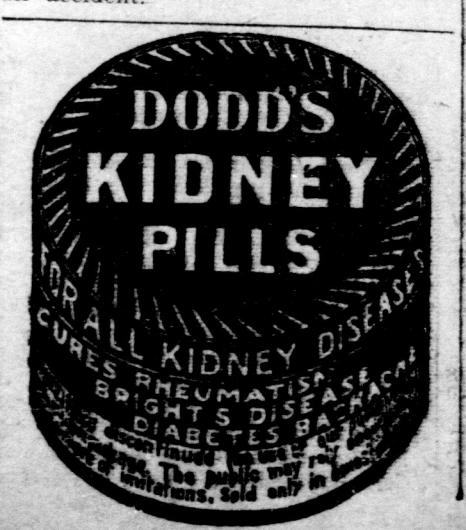
Question of Access to Interior Department Documents Again Up.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—The question of the production of the originals of several documents relating to business in the department of the interior, caused a little stir in the House today. Dr. Chisholm, of East Huron, became quite wrathful and characterized Hon. Mr. Oliver, the minister of the interior, as "the champion misquoting on the American continent." The question was brought up by Mr. R. B. Borden on a motion to go into committee of supply. He declared that the right to examine the originals of all papers except state papers had never been denied save in this instance, and that the Government was setting a dangerous precedent. He declared that Mr. Ames, the member for St. Antoine, was well within his rights in demanding the papers. Mr. Borden then moved the following resolution: "That subject to such consideration of the House and policy as can be validly urged in any case, it is the undoubted right of the people's representatives in Parliament assembled to be informed of everything necessary to explain the policy and proceedings of the Government, and for that purpose to have the opportunity of seeing and examining all documents connected with the transactions of public and the denial of such right by the Government justifies the refusal by this House of further supplies to the crown."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in reply, did not deny the right of Parliament to be informed on all subjects or to have access to the records in the interests of the public. A member might think he was entitled to see the originals, but that might not always be the case. If the member gave reasons why he should see the originals his wish would be complied with. The production of originals whenever any member thought himself entitled to ask for them would soon lead to an abuse of the privilege. He accused Mr. Borden of stating a mere truism. No good reasons had been put forward why the original documents should be produced.

Dr. Chisholm followed by an attack on Hon. Mr. Oliver. He declared that all the trouble in the House generally originated in the department of the interior. Dr. Chisholm called him the champion misquoting of the American continent. Mr. George E. Foster, also followed with an attack on the department. Hon. Mr. Oliver explained that he was the custodian of all the documents of his department. Members of Parliament had no more right to inspect the files than they had to investigate other people's business. If the files had ever been opened to their inspection it was against his orders.

At the final meeting on Feb. 1 of the Waterloo and City Railway Company (tube), London, which has been taken over by the London and Southwestern, the chairman mentioned that since the railway was completed, in 1898, it had an accident.



Rev. Mr. Inkster's Induction Feb. 27 Takes Charge of First Church March 1

Regular Meeting of the London Presbyterian Held Yesterday Afternoon

The regular meeting of the London Presbyterian was held yesterday in the lecture room of the First Presbyterian Church.

There was a good attendance of delegates, both lay and clerical. Several important matters came up for settlement.

Call Accepted.

The call from the First Presbyterian Church to Rev. J. G. Inkster, of Montreal, was received and accepted.

The induction will take place Thursday, Feb. 27, and Mr. Inkster will take charge of the First Church, March 1. Rev. Mr. Nichol, of Tall's Corners, will preach on that occasion.

Rev. Dr. Ross will address the minister, Rev. Dr. Munro, of the Proof Line road, will address the people, and the clerk, Rev. A. Henderson, will recite the steps leading up to the call.

The moderator, Rev. Dr. Macdonald, will preside.

After the induction, the Presbytery will be entertained by the ladies of the First Church to tea at 6 o'clock.

A call was presented to the presbytery for Rev. F. G. McDermid, of Fingal, on behalf of the congregation of St. Mary's, Barrie Presbytery.

Rev. Mr. Cranston, of that presbytery, laid the claims of the St. Mary's congregation before the London Presbytery.

Messrs. H. McLarty, J. H. Best, W. Lunn, McNish and Barber spoke on behalf of the congregation of Fingal.

All spoke of the splendid work that Mr. McDermid had done during the six years he had been in Fingal, and while they regretted exceedingly his departure, they could not put any obstacles in the way of his going, as St. Mary's was a much larger and better field of labor.

Mr. McDermid was a coming man, and they all would follow his course with pride.

Mr. McDermid accepted the call, and the Fingal pulpit will be declared vacant on Feb. 9.

He will preach his last sermon there on Feb. 2.

Rev. H. W. Reeds, of St. Thomas, will act as interim moderator.

A delegation, composed of Messrs. J. McParlane, Duncan McMillan and R. McMillan, from the Dutton congregation, appeared before the presbytery to protest against the installation of Mr. David Campbell, of Dutton, as elder in that congregation.

The trouble is but an echo of the former difficulty in the congregation.

There was nothing urged against Mr. Campbell of any weight whatever.

This matter took up the attention of the presbytery for several hours, and developed considerable discussion.

Rev. Mr. Malcolm and Mr. Law, of Dutton, spoke on behalf of the congregation, and declared that the election of Mr. Campbell was perfectly regular, and that there was nothing in the character of Mr. Campbell to prevent his election.

Mr. Campbell also spoke on his own behalf.

The delegation declared that the election as conducted by the moderator and Mr. Campbell was illegal.

The presbytery, after hearing all sides, sustained the action of the presbytery and the moderator, and sustained the election of Mr. Campbell.

Also Opposed Removal.

Mr. M. J. Donohue also opposed the removal. He built eleven houses on the strength of the fact that the Wellington street line would remain.

There was a large block of land in the northeastern portion of the city which would be built upon if the line were left where it is.

Mr. Donohue pointed out that Wellington street is 134 feet wide, while Richmond street is but 66.

He asked the committee to consider the matter carefully before deciding the question.

Mr. H. C. Graham spoke also against the removal of the line.

The New Loop.

Mr. M. D. Fraser spoke on behalf of the petition to extend the proposed new loop up William to Victoria, to Colborne street.

The present plan is to run this line east on Cheapside.

Mr. Fraser pointed out that the extension he proposed would serve that portion of the city more equitably.

It would grow rapidly if this loop were extended. He also opposed the removal of the Wellington street line.

Mr. H. H. Hackett declared that the residents of the northeast portion were delighted at the prospect of getting a street car service.

It would be of inestimable benefit in that portion of the city.

He advocated the extension of the line to Victoria street, as it would make a better route, would serve a greater section of the city, and would result in great good. He had confidence in the committee that the members would do the right thing by the citizens of that section.

the subject a thought. And as a close observer and frequent visitor to this place said the other day, "Port Stanley harbor with the necessary care and attention, that at the present time is being given to it by the Dominion Government, is destined to become one of the finest and most commodious harbors on the north shore of Lake Erie."

Greatest Satisfaction.

An interview with a number of officials in regard to the growth and possibilities of Port Stanley revealed the greatest satisfaction as well as expectations. That the import trade has increased by leaps and bounds is evidenced by the following testimony of one of the officials referred to:

"In the year 1892," one said, "the receipts from the import trade were little more than sufficient to pay the salary of the customs officer. In fact the total amount of duty collected for that year was \$390, collected chiefly from a few vessel loads of coal."

"At that time our harbor was very shallow and it was most difficult for vessels drawing more than eight or ten feet of water to enter. However, about that time the great possibilities of this harbor were brought to the attention of a number of capitalists who saw the advantages to be derived from this harbor as a port of entry."

Harbor Improved.

"Plans of improvement were made with the result that in 1897, the annual customs receipts had increased to \$1,907. Since then, however, the Dominion Government has done so much for the harbor that even the increase in import trade between 1897 and 1898 has been many times multiplied."

The work undertaken by the Laurier Government was the deepening of the channel, the building of the west slip dock pier and the general improvement of the harbor, all of which has resulted in a further increase in traffic.

Asked as to figures of this increase the same official replied:

The Figures.

"The import trade of Port Stanley has grown with such rapidity that for the fiscal year ending June, 1906, the customs duties levied here amounted to \$65,294. For the first nine months of the succeeding year the receipts were \$63,119, which will make the total for the year on a fair basis of \$7,000 per month, over \$800,000."

"With the completion of the new breakwater now under construction and the other harbor improvements contemplated by the Dominion Government, within a year or two our annual receipts for import duty alone at this port will be over \$1,000,000," the gentleman quoted concluded.

The Import Trade.

This was pointed to as an object lesson and the strongest and most effective harbor improvement from the aspect of a national asset as well as from a viewpoint of local interest.

The close attention to harbor improvement during the past ten years has more than increased the import trade—it has stimulated local business as is shown by the fact that over \$40,000 of local capital is invested in the fish industry. Over \$100,000 worth of fish was brought into this port during the past year.

All this healthy condition of trade is admitted by everyone to be due to the fact that the harbor here is well dredged, with nearly twenty feet of water, and accommodation for some of the largest steel boats in the Canadian fleet.

There is one town in Missouri where English is considered a foreign language, and where German is taught in every grade of public schools. The place is Hermann, the judicial seat of Gasconade County, east of Jefferson City. It is the greatest wine-producing town in the state. It is not in the Union. Of the 2,000,000 surplus exported from the state last year 2,940,000 gallons were sent from Hermann.

MAY CHANGE PLAY

Rules Committee Expected To Modify Forward Pass.

New York, Jan. 21.—The forward pass and many other much-discussed points of the football rules will be discussed and possibly modified at a meeting of the football rules committee which will be held in New York on Friday and Saturday. There has been so much discussion and criticism of the forward pass that it is probable that most of the time of the committee will be taken up in discussing this feature of the rules.

The intercollegiate association has already advocated a modification of the rule and several members of the old committee are said to favor such modification. The new committee consists of seven members elected by the Intercollegiate Association in addition to the seven members of the old committee. The members are: Prof. L. M. Dennis, Cornell, chairman; Prof. J. B. Fine, Princeton; Walter Camp, Yale; Joshua Crane, Harvard; H. B. Hackett, West Point; Paul Dashiell, Annapolis; John C. Bell, Pennsylvania; E. K. Hall, Dartmouth; Alonzo Stagg, Chicago; Dr. J. A. Babbitt, Haverford; Prof. C. W. Savage, Oberlin; Prof. Dudley Vandebilt; Dr. J. L. Lees, Nebraska; Dr. H. L. Williams, Minnesota.
