Question of Access to Interior Department Documents Again Up.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.-The question of the production of the originals of several documents relating to business in the department of the interior, caused a little stir in the House today. Dr. Chisholm, of East Huron, became quite wrathy, and characterized Hon. Mr. Oliver, the minister of the interior, as "the champion misquoter on the American continent." The question was brought up by Mr. R. L. Borden on a motion to go into committee of supply. He declared that the right to examine the originals of all papers except state papers had never been denied save in this instance, and that the Government was setting a dangerous precedent. He declared that Mr. Ames, the member for St. Antoine, was well within his rights in demanding the papers. Mr.


"That subject to such consideration of the House and policy as can be validly urged in any case, it is the undoubted right of the people's representatives in Parliament assembled to be informed of everything necessary to explain the polcy and proceedings of the Government, and for that purpose to have the opporunity of seeing and examining all docunents connected with the trasactions of public, and the denial of such right by he Government justifies the refusal by his House of further supplies to the

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in reply, did not eny the right of Parliament to be informed on all subjects or to have access the records if in the interests of the ublic. A member might think he was entitled to see the originals, but that night not always be the case. If the member gave reasons why he should see the originals his wish should be complied with.
