VICTORY BOND HOLDERS WARNED TO BEWARE OF UNSCRUPULOUS PERSONS

The minister of finance has requested all the banks to advise their managers throughout Canada to caution, on his behalf, the holders of Victory Loan bonds against the depredations of unscrupulous promoters and other persons, who may attempt to take advantage of the inexperience in financial matters of many of the holders of the bonds by inducing them to sell the bonds below their proper value in order to place the money in some questionable undertaking under promise of a phenomenal return to the investors.

The managers are authorized to say that the minister's object is to protect honest holders from the deceits of unprincipled promoters and salesmen of bogus securities. The minister of finance desires that the bank manager should not wait for the arrival of a promoter in his vicinity before cautioning the holders, and he asks that action be taken at once in the matter. Any holder of Victory Loan bonds desiring to dispose of them should do so through any responsible broker, which will insure their obtaining the full market value.


