LOCAL RESTAURANTS INSANITARY, BOARD OF HEALTH IS TOLD

One Citizen Fears Cockroaches Will Leave Kitchen For His Place.

Insanitary conditions prevail in many local eating places, according to reports made to the board of health at the regular meeting of that body in the city hall Tuesday afternoon. The proprietor of a local hotel appeared and complained that insanitary conditions prevailed in a Chinese cafe, which adjoins his building. He feared that thousands of cockroaches, which infested the kitchen of the cafe might get into his building, and for this reason he wanted the board to take action against such a thing. He could not force any action, because the Chinaman has a lease on the place.

The board promised that it would see that kitchen and the other parts of the cafe were cleaned. Dr. C. S. Tamm, veterinary inspector, had visited fifteen slaughter houses and butcher shops, and of these one, that of William Henson, 10 York street, was found to be unsatisfactory. The trouble was due probably to the ice box, it was thought. Much of the meat about the place was said to be unfit for use. This had been cast aside amongst the sales, which was the allegation. The board decided that the matter would

Have to be remedied or the shop closed.

Will Represent Plumbers. James R. Haslett, who is instructor of the plumbing class at the technical school, was appointed to represent the master plumbers on an examining board for plumbers. George A. Irons was appointed to represent the journeymen. The other members are Dr. W. S. Downham, M.O.M., and Plumbing Inspector James Young. These names were recommended by the latter in his first report to the board. It will be necessary for plumbers to pass a number of set examinations in order to get a license to carry on their business. Consideration will be given old men who have been at the trade all their lives and who could not follow any other occupation.

Milk Supply Satisfactory.

The milk supply seems to be in good condition. Dr. Tamm inspected 38 herds and dairies, and found them all to be satisfactory. Forty samples of milk taken were found to be very good.

Diphtheria, according to Dr. W. S. Downham's report, is very prevalent in the city, 25 cases having been reported in October. This is more than the total for the previous nine months. If a doctor is summoned in time, it is easily checked, he said, but if not the result is uncertain. Two deaths have occurred to date.

Other communicable diseases reported for the past month were: Chickenpox, 6; measles, 4; mumps, 3; scarlet fever, 2; tuberculosis, 1; whooping cough, 11, and venereal disease, 24. During the month one death resulted from tuberculosis, and one from acute primary pneumonia. According to the report from Victoria Hospital on contagion, 19 diphtheria cases were admitted to ward 1. Of these eleven were discharged, and one died. To ward 2, there were taken two cases of scarlet fever, while one was discharged. Four tuberculosis cases were admitted to ward 2. Three were discharged, and one died.
