Chicago Gossip.
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TO EXPROPRIATE SITE FOR CITY SEWAGE PLANT

Mayor Calls Special Meeting of City Council To-Morrow—Reorganizing Works Department.

Mayor Oliver, after a brief consultation with the board of control yesterday afternoon, decided to call a special meeting of the city council to-morrow for approval of a bylaw authorizing the expropriation of the Morley-avenue location of the sewage plant. The assessment commissioner has obtained options practically covering the whole block of land, but in some instances he considers the terms high. The total amount is at about \$28,000, and the mayor thinks that by having a court of arbitration fix the value the city will be able to save money.

The mayor made a step towards investigating the works department yesterday by asking for a list of employees of the department, with their positions and salaries.
The city engineer was criticized for sending a letter advising the city not to enforce penalties of \$200 against the Canada Poultry Co., which failed to deliver water pipes to the city within the contracted time.

Controlled by the board of control, the city engineer wants to know whether there are any steam and street railway crossings in the city besides the one at Front and John-streets which are protected by details Mr. Rust will report.

That the crossing of King and Yonge-streets seems to be under control of the street railway, the mayor has made by Controller Hocken, who said he had seen cars going in opposite directions crossing at the same time.
Chief of Police Grant will be asked to report why the police do not assume control.

The case of one Samuel Fieldhouse, who is suing the city for \$100,000, East Queen-street, and who was fined in the police court for non-compliance with bylaws in the building of an ex-hotel, is being reviewed by the board. Stewart, in support of Mr. Fieldhouse, said that the lower walls are 18 inches thick, also the legal requirement is only 12 inches, and assistant architect Price said that the objection was that broken bricks were used and were not properly bonded. The city will have them inspected again.

The mayor thinks that too much publicity is being given the plans for taking care of the sewer, and that it may result in an influx.
N. W. Ford, 36 Dunn-avenue, is of opinion that the assessment on land in city blocks furnished by him is too high, as compared with that of adjacent property, and intends to appeal in the courts against the assessment of about 100 properties, which he considers too low.

Controller Spence is not satisfied with the particulars regarding the sale of city bonds furnished to the board, and is again urging that the transactions be made public. The mayor is, however, opposed to publicity.
