CANADA DISSATISFIED?

British Consular Agents Not Pushing Canadian Trade

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
LONDON, Jan. 7.—Sir Edward Grey, consulted on the appointment of W. R. Preston to Amsterdam, states that the office was created purely for commercial purposes for the benefit of Canadian trade.

In colonial circles in London the appointment is taken to indicate that Canadian statesmen were not satisfied that the facilities given by the imperial consular service are adequate for pushing colonial trade.

Direct representation has already been given by the South African Government with good results, and it is hoped Canadian trade will be similarly helped by the new appointment.

It has been suggested that the appointment of a Canadian representative in the imperial consular service should be placed on the agenda of the next imperial conference unless the present arrangement on the part of the colonies renders earlier action desirable.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 7.—One fireman was burned to death, six others were injured, several women were overcome by smoke, and 200 hotel guests were driven into the street this morning when fire broke out in a barber shop, in the heart of the business district.

Chief Haynes broke open the door of the barber shop, and Tasche was burned to a crisp almost instantly in the sheet of flame that rushed into the room. He fell unconscious but was rescued. Loss \$100,000.

ANNUAL EXHIBITION OF

CANADIAN ART OPENED

Productions of Native Artists Make Creditable Showing in New Gallery.

The third annual exhibition of the Canadian Art Club was formally opened yesterday evening by his honor Lieutenant-Governor Gibson in the gallery of the art museum of Toronto Public Library. About 300 people were assembled in the art room when President D. R. Wilkie delivered the opening address. In his remarks the chairman paid great tribute to Canadian art as displayed on the surrounding walls.

"The previous exhibitions," he pointed out, "had been held in the old historical building, Adelaide-street, amongst surroundings which the members only left after considerable hesitation and with much regret." Now the club was able to display the productions of its members to so much better advantage in this excellent new location. "The club was now enabled to form a stronger force in moulding national aims. The idea has happily passed away," he continued, "the art existed in Canada. The works now on exhibition give proof of this statement. Art holds a high place in the life of the nation. The Canadian artist is placed in the first rank whose history is deficient in this regard." In conclusion he expressed the hope that the exhibition would be a success and that the Canadian art would be able to go abroad before gaining recognition.

The exhibition was then formally declared open by Lieutenant-Governor Gibson. His honor congratulated the club for offering the citizens of Toronto such an excellent opportunity of educating themselves in this worthy manner. He pointed out that the idea of the society was to draw together the entire talent of Canada and to foster Canadianism in the arts.

Altho the committee to the exhibition opened in the galleries of the new public library yesterday evening, with only one exception, members of the club had been given the opportunity to see the exhibition. The interest on that account, about 75 pictures, almost all landscapes and seascapes, and they have been displayed to great advantage, all being of the highest quality and with good artistic effect. But the restriction in number has resulted in a high level of excellence and a very favorable opportunity has thus been given to the public to see some of the best Canadian art.

Nearly all the canvases are recent but some have been painted before. Most of them bear evidence that they have been painted with a clear and definite impulse and realize genuinely artistic expression. The exhibition of appeal and still more of treatment prevents monotony and calls attention to finer points of difference that might otherwise escape observation.

Another feature of the exhibition is the high level of the art. The canvases are typical of his strong and virile art and the width of his artistic vision. A seascape and a companion picture of a rock-bound coast arrest the observer by reason of their splendid renderings of storm effect. The air itself is dark with the gloom of tempest. Others of his large paintings are conspicuous for their admirable studies of tree forms, solid land contours and capacity to suggest motion and movement.

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YANKEE CONSUL PROMOTED

H. D. Vanzant of Kingston is Sent to Scottish City.

KINGSTON, Jan. 7.—(Special.)—Howard D. Vanzant, United States consul, has been notified from Washington of his promotion to the consulate at Dundee, Scotland, a city of 20,000 inhabitants on the North Sea. He will be succeeded here on March 1 by Felix S. Johnson, now consul at Bergen, Norway. The transfer is a promotion for Mr. Vanzant, who has been in the service only five years, in which time he has received four advancements. He was first appointed as consul at Guelph.

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A Legislative Tangle.
Somewhat startling is the intelligence that comes from the parliament buildings to the effect that no provision is by law provided for bribery in connection with local option campaigns, or in fact in any vote taken under the Liquor License Act.

Street Car Men Fined.
For assaulting Frank McCormack, a passenger, who tendered a \$5 note in payment of his fare, Joseph Butler and Thomas Gallagher, motorman and conductor of a Dupont-street car, each fined \$5 and costs or thirty days.

The pair were convicted on the charge of common assault.
